4.1	Discussions took place with regard to Options and how to progress going forw ard – The main points clarified were;		
4.2	The draft land use budget for the development as currently set out in Table 2 of the Draft Issues and Options Report provides a set of w orking assumptions for the SPD. The Report states "it is anticipated that the volumes of development set out in Table 2 will be refined further in order to achieve the right balance betw een housing, open space, and infrastructure."		
4.3	As discussed there is a clearly a degree of tension betw een the need to accommodate sufficient land for housing to achieve overall viability of the proposed urban extension and the amount of public open space required.		
4.4	It was agreed that further work was necessary in respect of the Options and that neither the currently expressed figure for housing nor that for open space should be regarded as sacrosanct at this stage depending on considerations of viability and good planning and urban design.	DLA/IBC	
4.5	Further dialogue took place with regard to housing, with low er density being the desired option from the developer's point of view.		
4.6	IBC sited general concern for the lack of provision of green space in the heart of the development.
