


APPENDIX A HOMELESSNESS REVIEW 2018



Homelessness Review

Commentary

In 2017/18 Ipswich Borough Council prevented homelessness in 521 cases; 130 households were able to remain in their existing homes and 391 households were assisted to find alternative accommodation. This is a 13% rise since 2016/17 and an 88% rise in preventions since 2010/11. This is different to the national picture: England as a whole saw a 0.5% decrease in preventions from 2016/17 to 2017/18 and only a 21% increase in preventions from 2010/11 to 2016/17.



In 2017/18 Ipswich Borough Council accepted 175 households as homeless, in priority need and not intentionally homeless. This is a rise of 2% since 2016/17 and a 75% increase in acceptances since 2010/11. Ipswich does not mirror the national trend; England as a whole saw a 4.2% decrease in acceptances from 2016/17 to 2017/18 and a 28% increase in acceptances since 2010/11.²

In 2017/18 there were 264 homeless presentations to Ipswich Borough Council. 62% of the presentations were from females and 38% from males. 36% of the presentations were from people aged between 20 and 29^3 ; this is a higher proportion than is representative of the population of Ipswich as a whole; the 2011 Census recorded 15.5% of the population being between the age of 20 and 29. 4

In 2017/18, 66% of accepted homeless households were in priority need due to having dependent children. This figure has remained broadly static since 2013/14. The second largest reason for



priority need of accepted homeless cases in 2017/18 was mental illness or disability; this accounted for almost 11% of all accepted cases. ⁵

In 2017/18, 22% of all accepted households were homeless due to friends or relatives no longer being able to accommodate them and 21% were homeless due to the termination of an Assured Shorthold Tenancy. Almost 10% were homeless due to violent breakdown of a relationship involving a partner and 5% were homeless due to parents no longer willing to accommodate them. ⁶




At the latest count in autumn 2017 there were estimated to be 21 people sleeping rough in Ipswich. This is a 22% decrease from the previous year, when there were estimated to be 27 people sleeping rough in Ipswich. However, there has been an over 60% increase in the number of people estimated to be rough sleeping since autumn 2010. The rough sleeping rate in Ipswich is 0.35 per 1000 households; this is more than the rough sleeping rate for England, the East of England and all the local districts except for St Edmundsbury. Ipswich Borough Council has successfully bid for Government funding to target and reduce rough sleeping in Ipswich.

In 2017/18, there were 710 lets in Ipswich through Choice Based Lettings. 146 of these were lets to households who had been accepted as homeless; this accounts for 21% of all the Choice Based Lettings in Ipswich that year. The proportion of lets to accepted homeless households is on an upward trend; in 2013/14, the percentage of lets to accepted homeless households was 14%. The overall number of lets in 2017/18 was 45% less than 2015/16 and 11% less than 2017/18.

Ipswich has seen an increase in numbers in temporary accommodation; the official data is a snapshot of temporary accommodation use on 31st March every year. On 31st March 2018, Ipswich had 59 households in temporary accommodation; this is the largest number since 31st March 2011. This equates to a 20% rise since 31st March 2017 and a 51% increase since 31st March 2010. This data mirrors the national trend; England saw a 3% rise in temporary accommodation use from 2017 to 2018 and a 55% increase since 31st March 2010. ⁸ Ipswich also records this data on a weekly basis; looking at a snapshot (1st Wednesday of every month) shows that there has been a 21% increase in households in temporary accommodation from October 2017 (61 households) to October 2018 (77 households). ⁹ The average length of stay in temporary accommodation has increased by 100% since March 2014 when the average length of stay in temporary accommodation was 7 weeks; the average length of stay in temporary accommodation in March 2018 was 14 weeks. ¹⁰

Housing related support services help people to live independently or move on to independent living, this can include people receiving support to: set up and maintain their home, manage safety and security of their accommodation and maintain their health and wellbeing. In Ipswich in 2017/18, there were 984 applications for accommodation through Housing Related Support and 428

application for community support. In the same year, 246 applicants were assisted with accommodation and 376 applicants were assisted with community support.
