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Title of report: Review of existing Ipswich Borough Council's Cumulative Impact Assessment within their Licensing Policy Statement.

Report : The Licensing Act 2003 requires each Licensing Authority to prepare a Licensing Policy Statement setting out the basis on which it will perform its Licensing Act 2003 functions. A policy statement has a life of up to five years, the current policy expires December 2024. Within this policy is a Cumulative Impact Assessment (CIA) which must be reviewed within three years to consider whether the assessment is still valid. To carry out the review the Licensing Authority must consult with persons listed in section 5(3) of the Licensing Act 2003.

The effect of the CIA is that it creates a rebuttable presumption, which means that applications for Premises Licences that provide 'on' and 'off' sales of alcohol and /or late night refreshments within the defined area, will normally be refused unless the applicant can demonstrate in their operating schedule that they will not have an adverse effect on licensing objectives, thus adding to the cumulative impact.
