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SUMMARY

- Holywells Park is a 28 hectare beautiful open space, with stunning trees and ponds, heritage buildings and a green hub for the community, owned and run by the local authority, Ipswich Borough Council.
- Holywells Park is designated a Conservation Area with two listed buildings – the Stable Block and Victorian conservatory – and is on the English Heritage register of historic parks and gardens of special historic interest.
- In July 2012 Holywells Park was awarded a grant of £2.8 million toward the restoration and enhancement of Holywells Park. Ipswich Borough Council, with the support of the Friends of Holywells Park and volunteer time, added £700,000 in funding, making the total grant award £3.5 million.
- The park's heritage landscape has been restored including the main pond network, lower section of the 20th Century garden, the Ornamental Shrubberies, Wetland Garden and Bishop Wyke landform. The re-creation of the old terrace with a replacement balustrade wall has restored the historic views of the park.
- The Stable Block has been renovated to provide a visitor centre incorporating a reception and information point, multi-use educational and exhibition areas, a cafe, new visitor toilets and a Changing Place. A workshop to the rear of the stables has been added and used by Orwell Mencap Green Bike Project.
- Renovation of the Victorian Conservatory, Walled Garden with a performance area has provided a multi-use space for functions, exhibitions and meetings.
- Improvements have been completed to the park's entrances.
- A new toilet block and kiosk next to the play area, an item highly requested through public consultation has been built, along with the installation a new piece of I-play equipment for teenagers.
- The set of actions in the Activity Plan encouraged more people from the under-represented groups

- (the over 45s, people with disabilities and from ethnic minority backgrounds) to visit the park and engage in more active pursuits using the whole park. Visitor numbers of 434,780 in 2017/18 indicate that this park is well used in comparison with national figures for similar parks. The proportion of children and teenagers using the park were higher compared to those of the population in the borough catchment area.
- A Health & Wellbeing programme, new footpaths and outdoor classroom facilities have been created and installed.
- New leaflets, entrance boards, interpretation boards, trails, heritage interpretation rooms and online information have been installed, including a Friends of Holywells Park website, Facebook and Twitter accounts.
- A wide variety of events have been held following the Action Plan, attracting the project's target audiences. The events include Holi – Festival of Colour, Family Fun Days, Chopin in the Park, World Food and Music days and Bangladeshi Community Picnics. The park's restoration has attracted independent event companies which now host a range of events in the park including music festivals and outdoor cinema.
- Holywells Park had accumulated 6,383 volunteer days over the life of the project, amounting to £493,491.00 of volunteer time an increase of 33% of the original target of £329,000. The park now has two weekly groups, the Gardening Club and Volunteer Rangers helping deliver the park's Management and Maintenance Plan.
- Ice House discovered and restored by volunteers.
- The project has covered 22 training areas, with 218 volunteers and 24 staff undertaking formal training.
- The project has helped Holywells retain a Green Flag Award for the past eight years, awarded a distinction for the Holywells Park Renovation by the Ipswich Society in 2015 and was the winner of the Civic Voice Design Awards 2016. The park has attained 4.5 star status on TripAdvisor for the constant achievement of high ratings from visitors.







INTRODUCTION

Holywells Park is a beautiful open space, with stunning trees and ponds, heritage buildings, and is also a green hub for the community. There is something for people of all ages and abilities to enjoy. Holywells Park is owned and run by the local authority, Ipswich Borough Council (IBC).



Holywells Park is a County Wildlife Site, a Conservation Area with two listed buildings – the Stable Block and Conservatory – and is on the English Heritage Register of Historic Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest. Holywells has been designated a Regionally Important Geodiversity Site (RIGS).

The park extends over 28 hectares of picturesque grounds, with a history dating back to medieval times. The park was originally part the Manor of Wykes Bishop, held by the Bishops of Norwich from the 13th Century. During the reign of Henry VIII, the Manor was surrendered to the Crown and then granted to Sir John Jeremy. The title of Lord of the Manor was acquired by John Cobbold in 1811.

The Cobbold family purchased what was the Pitts Farm estate in 1811 to use the park's spring water for their

brewery business. The Cobbold's had begun their brewery in Harwich but had problems with the water there and for many years used ships to transport water from Holywells to Harwich and then to return Ipswich with beer.

Holywells House was built by 1814 on the site of an old farmhouse but was unfortunately demolished in 1962 due to an infestation of wood rot. Its Victorian gardens were redesigned in the 20th Century in accordance with the ideas of gardeners such as Gertrude Jekyll.

The Cobbold's sold the estate in 1930 to Lord Woodbridge who subsequently bequeathed the land to the town and it was opened as a park in 1936.







Why was there a need to restore Holywells Park?

In 2000 the document Ipswich Historic Parks Restoration Project was developed by Ipswich Borough Council Parks and Open Spaces which proposed the restoration of Ipswich's flagship heritage parks.

Designation of Holywells Park as a Conservation Area in September 2003 recognised its special status in the absence of inclusion on the English Register of Historic Parks and Gardens. The park has two listed buildings, the Stable Block and Orangery both listed Grade II.

The vision of Ipswich Borough Council Parks and Open Spaces is:

'To safeguard and enhance the environment and improve everyone's quality of life by working in partnership with others to ensure that our parks and open spaces are well designed, well managed, safe and freely accessible, encouraging use and benefitting the whole community'.

Ipswich Borough Council produced an 'Open Space & Biodiversity Policy/Strategy 2013-2023'. An outcome of the Strategy is to ensure heritage parks and heritage features within our parks are afforded appropriate protection.

The park is also recognised for its biodiversity and geomorphology through its County Wildlife Site (CWS) in 1991, and Regionally Important Geo-diversity Site (RIGS) in 2009, designations.

In 2013 the park is to be designated as a Local Nature Reserve (LNR). A number of notable and Biodiversity Action Plan species are found at the park. These are as follows:

Birds

Lapwing, Song Thrush, Bullfinch, Dunnock, Spotted Flycatcher, Lesser Redpoll, Herring Gull, House Sparrow, Starling and Nightingale

Mammals

Hedgehog, Noctule, Common and Soprano Pipistrelle Bats and Water Vole

Inverts

Tree Bee (Bombus hypnorum) 1st record for Suffolk Sept 2010, White Letter Hairstreak, Solitary Bee (Lasioglossum sexnotatum) RDB1, Cerceris quinquefasciata RDB3 wasp

Reptiles

Grass Snake, Common Lizard and Slow Worm







The Cobbold Family History Trust wrote enthusiastically in favour of the restoration project in its earliest days. Its optimism has been fully justified. We thought then that John Cobbold who built Holywells and the four generations which lived there would have been keen on the project and that support has been wholly rewarded.

The Trust has both contributed to the success of the project and benefitted from it. The Keeper of the Trust was graciously invited to speak at the opening ceremony on which occasion we also launched our book Holywells, Home of the Cobbolds by Clive Hodges which tells of the original mansion and the families who lived there. Only last year, Holywells kindly hosted the successful Cobbold History charity cycle ride which started and finished in the park.

One of the displays in the newly refurbished stables features items which portray the history of the Tolly Cobbold brewery; much enjoyed by the older generations who appreciated the odd pint of Cobbold beer in their youth. The universally acclaimed interpretation boards, enjoyed by visitors, were designed, on the Trust's recommendation, by Martin Surgey who carries out all the Trust's graphic design work.

When we think back to the days when the Conservatory was encased in corrugated iron we realise just how fortunate we are to now have such a wonderful park so close to the centre of Ipswich. No wonder the trust makes Holywells its first port of call when showing visitors around!

What was planned?

The vision for Holywells Park is to create a multicultural and multi-age audience for the park where bespoke events, activities and education will occur for the whole community.

"By 2015 visitors to Holywells Park will have an increased knowledge about the heritage and environment of the park and be able to access all the historic buildings and landscapes. There will be a wider range of cultural, heritage and environmental events and a health and wellbeing package for visitors to enjoy attracting a wider audience into the park. The audiences that will be increased are over 45s, BAME groups, single adults, access groups and teenagers."

A successful Round 2 submission to the Heritage Lottery Fund was made and the project was awarded a grant of Σ 2.8m toward the restoration and enhancement of Holywells Park. Ipswich Borough Council match-funded the award with Σ 700,000.00 with additional financial support from the Friends of Holywells Park and volunteer time making the grant award of Σ 3.5m.

The Holywells Park, Parks for People project Delivery Phase commenced in July 2013 with the following approved aims and concluded in June 2018.

Key milestones/approved aims:

- Recruit the Project Manager, Community
 Engagement Officer and Administrative Support to deliver the project.
- 2. Restore the heritage landscape including the main pond network, lower section of the 20th Century garden, the Ornamental Shrubberies, Wetland Garden and Bishop Wyke landform.
- 3. Renovate the Stable Block to provide a visitor centre incorporating a reception and information point, multi-use educational and exhibition areas, a cafe, new visitor toilets and new toilets and shower for staff and volunteers. Add a workshop to the rear of the stables to be used by Orwell Mencap Green Bike Project.
- 4. Renovate the Victorian Conservatory to provide multi-use space for functions, exhibitions and meetings.
- 5. Recreate the old terrace as a lawn with a replacement balustrade restoring views towards the ponds and providing a performance area.
- 6. Carry out improvements to the park's entrances including new gates, railings and signage. Install CCTV, fire and intruder alarms, external lighting and new furniture.
- 7. Build a new toilet block and kiosk adjacent to the play area and install a new piece of i-Play equipment for teenagers.

- 8. Install new footpaths and engage volunteers to refurbish the woodland paths and create outdoor classroom facilities.
- As part of the Health & Well Being programme install a Trim Trail with nine exercise stations, a Measured Mile and an orienteering course.
- Produce and install new interpretation boards with QR codes illustrating a heritage trail, nature and wildlife trail and the newly discovered ice house.
- 11. Create a new volunteer area in the existing leaf yard with mess and storage facilities.
- 12. Recruit new volunteers and provide volunteering opportunities in heritage management, conservation, horticulture, delivering events and activities, interpretation research and design, surveys, archiving and administration. Establish a Conservation Club and a Horticulture Club.
- 13. Deliver training for staff and volunteers as detailed in the Activity Plan.
- 14. Deliver a programme of activities by partners and trained volunteers as detailed in the Activity Plan to promote learning and skills related to the park's history, health and well-being and ecology.
- 15. Evaluate the project and provide HLF with an evaluation report at project completion.

The approved aims are covered and discussed throughout the report.







John Norman, Chairman of the Ipswich Society, writes:

"You will be aware that the Ipswich Society have been impressed with the restoration and changes made to Holywells Park over the past few years that we nominated it for a Civic Voice Design Award, and quite rightly your team were successful. A blue plaque is now proudly displayed outside the stables.

The restoration and return to use of the Conservatory has created an outstanding asset, a facility that is being put to good use by community groups, wedding parties and us (The Ipswich Society) for our summer garden party.

There are many other changes around the park that are much less obvious but equally important to the wide variety of park users, for example the 'classrooms' as you term your woodland shelters, ideal for gathering a group together to explain the finer points of the fauna and flora, the geology or the history.

And it is this wide variety of park users that make your efforts so worthwhile, it is not unusual to walk through the park and come across a choir practicing from an elevated position, cyclists on their way to work or bowls players in their pristine whites.

From a personal point of view, however, the children's playground takes some beating. My grandchildren, who ordinarily reside in Denmark (a country renown for the provision of public play spaces), absolutely love it and frequently request a holiday in England, not to see Gran or Grandpa but simply to visit Holywells."

1. THE PARK

The project recruited a Project Manager and administration support for 30 months and the Community Engagement and Volunteer Officer (Cevo) for six years. The project manager and administration support were in post to aid development of the Round 2 submission and for the first two years of the project. The Cevo was in post for the life of the project.

As part of the project the heritage landscape of the park including the main pond network, the lower terrace section of the 20th Century garden, the ornamental shrubberies, the Dell Garden and a moated section of the Bishops Wyke landform were restored and brought back into use.

The project renovated the Grade II listed Stable Block to provide a visitors centre incorporating a reception, multi-use educational and exhibition areas, a café and new visitor toilets. As part of the renovation a workshop to the rear of the stable was built that is used by Orwell Mencap Green Bike Project.

The Stable Block is now a thriving community hub with an average 12,031 visitors per annum compared to 6,000 visitors per annum when it first open in 2015.

The now café space was being occupied by the Ground Maintenance Team for machinery and chemical storage. Added internal walls were removed to the original layout of the carriage shed. The brick paver flooring was lifted and relayed with underfloor heating installed. All remaining original features of the carriage shed were retained in the restoration of the space














1. THE PARK



The reception is now a fully glazed space with underfloor heating, reception desk and shelving. The space is a visitor information point and a small retail outlet. The unique reception desk and shelving was designed and built by a local bespoke furniture maker from an oak tree that blew down in the park in St Jude's Storm.











1. THE PARK



People with profound and multiple learning disabilities, as well as people with other physical disabilities such as spinal injuries, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis often need extra equipment and space to allow them to use the toilets safely and comfortably. These needs are met by Changing Places toilets.



New male, female and disabled toilets facilities have been installed in the Stable Block. The new facilities were moved to a different location within the block, allowing more space and accessibility.



With the restoration of the Stable Block, a new work depot had to be created to store equipment, vehicles and a mess room for staff located in the Stable Block. The existing Leaf Yard was transformed into a fully operational works yard with containers as storage facilities and a fully operational mess room with a drying room, kitchen, office and toilets.

The Friends of Holywells Park contributed £9,000 towards the mess room.







1. THE PARK

The Genesis Orwell Mencap Green Bike Project's new workshop has allowed the project to grow with more individuals being part of the project.





Nino Serritello, CEO of Genesis Orwell Mencap, writes:

"The idea is simple. We take in unwanted bicycles from the general public and go about fixing them up with the help of our service-users, providing training, life skills and work-based experience for people with learning disabilities.

The project is based at the picturesque old Victorian Stable Block at Holywells Park in Ipswich after its Heritage Lottery funded renovation. The Stable Block along with the stunning conservatory and terraced gardens have been rejuvenated by the recent work and look stunning.

The emphasis of the project is very much upon sharing and encouraging people to learn new skills for the benefit of the whole community."







1. THE PARK

The renovation of the Victorian conservatory to provide a multi-use space from functions, events, exhibitions and meeting is a major success for the project. The structure had been mothballed under corrugated steel for 15 years and the project enabled the building to be restored to its former glory.

The conservatory was modernised during the restoration by removing the planting borders to extend the available floor space. This also enabled a heating system to be installed so the space can be used all year round. The old boiler room located at the back of the conservatory was remodelled into a kitchenette and a store room. Within the renovation, services were put into the store room so if required in the future could be easily turned into a toilet. The conservatory has its original tiled flooring, pond features and sash windows re-glazed with 5mm toughened Goethe restoration glass.

The conservatory has hosted a number of events including Chopin in the Park, Eat the Beat world music and food festival, outdoor theatre, Tai Chi and yoga, community projects, weddings, christenings, birthday parties and baby showers. The income the events generate contributes towards the receptionist post at the Stable Block.











1. THE PARK





The project recreated the old terrace as a lawn with a replacement balustrade wall restoring views towards the ponds.

Before the project the area was very overgrown with shrubs and trees and only utilised as an overflow car park which was not welcoming for park users to enjoy the area.

A number of select trees and shrubs were removed from the lower terrace, new brick piers and balustrade wall were constructed.







New raised planted borders, raised lawns, benches and surfacing with disabled access has opened up the area to all park users and restored amazing vistas across the park.

A new surfaced footpath was created to link the lower terrace steps down into the park with a play area.







1. THE PARK



Along with the restoration of the lower terrace, the Walled Garden, which stands where the Cobbold mansion once stood, was rejuvenated. The Walled Garden was not perceived as an inclusive part of the park due to its high walls, narrow and restricted entrances with no through route and the oppressive corrugated steel-clad conservatory.



A performance area for outside events has been created within the walled garden and now links the Stable Block with the conservatory which was previously perceived as three separate areas. The northern boundary wall for the garden was lowered with a new disabled access created into the Walled Garden. The entrances on the eastern and western walls were widened to open up the Walled Garden.













1. THE PARK









The four entrances to the park were redesigned to ensure they were more visible and inviting. From the project's initial research it was found people who had lived in Ipswich all their lives had never visited Holywells Park due to not knowing where it was.

The original entrances were narrow and dark due to tree canopy cover which made the entrances unwelcoming. The project reduced the tree and canopy cover around the entrances making them feel brighter and safer.

New gate structures were built at Cliff Lane and Bishops Hill entrance with Nacton Road and Myrtle Road undergoing restoration to brickwork and the wrought iron gates.

Cliff Lane, the main entrance to the park, was tired and not fit for purpose. The entrance was inconspicuous and people did not realise it was an entrance to Holywells Park. Members of the public could drive into

the park and park their vehicle along the entrance road and small car park. This compromised health and safety with pedestrians, often mothers with small children, and vehicles using the same route.

The project made the decision to pedestrianise the entrance and only allow Permit and Blue Badge holders to use the small car park. This reduced the potential risk of a vehicle/pedestrian accident and made the entrance a wider more welcoming experience.

New brick piers with named stone insets of the park were constructed which the new gates hang from. The new gates depict a pattern of water and reeds resembling the park's main landscape feature.

Granite sets were laid at the road and car park entrances and off set with a resin-bound gravel.

Bishops Hill entrance showing holly and sycamore trees removed, making the entrance more visible and welcoming. The removal of the trees also allowed the public to see into the park.

The new gates, piers and wall with named stone insets of the park and laid granite setts have been constructed and laid at Bishops Hill entrance as at Cliff Lane entrance. The entrance gate has been brought forward, closer to the road, making the whole entrance more visible and welcoming.









Myrtle Road and Nacton Road entrances had their tree canopies lifted and some tree removal to allow light in, resulting in a welcoming and safe environment into the park.

The entrance slope at Nacton Road now has a less steep gradient as surveys showed members of the public found it a hazard especially in wet and icy condition.

Both entrances had granite set borders and resinbound gravel surfaces laid.







1. THE PARK

From initial surveys conducted in the Round 2 development phase it was discovered that the most requested item from park users were toilets at the play area. The park's play area is situated in the centre of the park which is 230 metres from the Stable Block toilets. The surveys indicated that though the play area is not a great distance to the Stable Block, if a sole parent/guardian/career was looking after two or more children they would have to pack up all belongings and take all children with them to the toilet.

It was decided to construct a building to include two accessible toilets, a changing room and kiosk. The kiosk is leased to the same tenant that runs the stable block café and serves ice creams and hot and cold drinks.

With the restorations and improvements to the park, the project installed seven CCTV cameras covering the Stable Block, Walled Garden and Victorian conservatory. PTZ cameras were installed to cover the car parking area and main entrance and the parks working compound. The existing PTZ cameras that covered the play area were unified into the new CCTV system that is fed back to the Emergency Control Room at Ipswich Borough Council's Grafton House. All buildings had fire and intruder alarms installed along with external lighting at the Stable Block and conservatory entrances.



















2. THE PEOPLE

THREE TYPES OF RESEARCH WERE CARRIED OUT FOR HOLYWELLS PARK:

- Visitor Observation Surveys
- Park Questionnaire
- Travel Survey

The main purpose of the Visitor Observation Survey (VOS) was to help us calculate an accurate estimate of visitors to the park and the activities they were engaged in. The park questionnaire asked questions about several topics relating to the park, including frequency of visits to the park, areas of the park they visited, activities they currently participate in and those they would like to see in the future. In addition, as an optional question, we asked details about the individual which included age, ethnicity and postcode. The postcode details gave us a better understanding of where our park visitors had come from.

The VOS were mainly carried out by volunteers conducting 22 hours of surveys every year of the project. These took place between 8am and 7pm on weekdays and over the weekends in school term time and school summer holidays, relating to the opening times of Holywells Park.

The data from the VOS can be found in Appendix 1 and the data for the park questionnaire can be found in Appendix 2.







2. THE PEOPLE

The table below shows the visitor profile characteristics for gender, age and ethnicity for the 2012/13 VOS compared 2017/18 VOS and the 2011 Census Information for Ipswich. The table shows:

- Visitor numbers of 434,780 in 2017/18 indicate that this park is well used in comparison with national figures for similar parks.
- Holywells Park is particularly popular with families of young children and their carers.
- The genders were represented fairly evenly in the visitor profile with a slight increase in males visiting the park which may indicate more families as a whole now visit the park
- The proportions of children and teenagers were higher compared to those of the population in the borough catchment area.
- Very few people with an observable disability were seen in the park through the VOS, though the project feels this does not represent the true number.
- The initial VOS indicated the proportion of people over 45 years of age was low and the majority of adult users appeared to be relatively inactive.
 Through the projects Activity Plan the over 45

- audience in the park has increased by 13% and more active
- The level of visits on weekdays was very slightly
 higher than that at weekends, which is a typical of
 similar parks elsewhere, where use at weekends can
 be typically twice as high as during the week. This
 was thought to be an effect of the popularity of the
 Play Area for pre-school children and the absence of
 the commuters and through routers at weekends.
- The initial survey found that the majority of use is concentrated in and around the Play Area, with less than expected use made of the walled garden, meadow and canal areas. Even though the play area is still the most popular location in the park the restoration of the walled garden and stable block has greatly increased visitor numbers to these areas.
- The set of actions in the Activity Plan encouraged more people from the under-represented groups (the over 45s, people with disabilities and from ethnic minority backgrounds) to visit the park and engage in more active pursuits using the whole park.


Shown below are some highlights from the data sets from the 2012 and 2018 Park Questionnaire.

QUESTION 3

Which areas of the park do you usually visit?

It can be seen that there is a 34% increase of individuals using the Walled Garden and Stable Block. This is mostly due to the Stable Block now being fully accessible and refurbished. The improvements and restoration works to the Walled Garden have also made the area more accessible.


QUESTION 4

What do you normally do when you visit the park?

It can be seen from the graph below that there has been an increase with people going for a walk, attending events and having something to eat/drink. More individuals and groups are visiting the park to enjoy the open space and the facilities that the park now offers.

The project has seen an increase in events held in the park and this is shown with a 16% increase of people visiting for events and activities. There is also a marked increase with people having something to eat at the park made all the more possible with the new Stable café and kiosk.

Table 3. Data sets presenting what individuals do when visiting the park








QUESTION 5

Table 4. Data sets presenting how people travel to the park










QUESTION 10

What makes you visit the park more?

As can be seen from the graph the percentage of visitors to the park no longer deems the key issues highlighted in the initial questionnaire of such a great concern. The infrastructure that the project has provided in the park has significantly improved the facilities. This is demonstrated by the graph data "Nothing – happy with current provision" with an increase of 26% to 44% of park users. In all other data sets the percentage response has been significantly been reduced.

3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

The following information follows the Activity Plan that was submitted as part of the Round 2 documents (Appendix 3) and as such the numbering refers to the activity plan's outcomes.

1. INCREASING THE RANGE OF THE AUDIENCE

1.1. INFORMATION LEAFLET

Holywells Park Information leaflet was designed inhouse with research conducted by the Friends of Holywells Park, Tourist and Heritage students from University Campus Suffolk and volunteers.

The leaflet contains information about the park's heritage and conservation designations along with the park's assets and activities.

These include:

- Stable Block visitor centre and café
- Green Bike Project
- Victorian conservatory
- Play area
- Outdoor theatre space
- Walking trails
- Friends of Holywells Park
- Events and activities
- Volunteering
- Car parking

The leaflets were produced in time for the 2015 grand opening event and were under budget with design cost at £260 and printing cost at £500. This has allowed the project to use the remaining budget to improve the park's entrance boards.

The leaflet has attracted a wider audience into the park aided by leaflet distribution to hard to reach groups. This is shown in the parks annual visitor observation surveys. The leaflet has served as a great information aid for people new to the park. The map allows people to find specific locations in the park.









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.2. DEVELOP ONLINE INFORMATION

The project has developed two websites for Holywells Park. One site is hosted internally on the Ipswich Borough Council website

Through the website the public can view and download the park's series of leaflets, view an interactive map of the park that identifies key area of the park, take Google tours around the renovated Stable Block visitor centre, play area, the Walled Garden and outdoor performance area and the Victorian conservatory.

One can also find information concerning volunteering opportunities at the park with the Gardening Club and Volunteer Rangers.

The site also provides links to the Friends' website, bus services to the park and car parking around the park.

The table below shows the number unique page views for Holywells Park from December 2013. This is soon after the updated website went live. We do not have records previous to this as the web server was changed at this date.

3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

The Friends website was created through the project by a volunteer. Below is a summary from the volunteer and the work that was achieved.

"I started helping with the Holywells Park website (holywellspark.org.uk) in November 2016. I had noticed that the website had not been updated for a long while and after making further enquiries I discovered that there was no one who knew how to edit the site.

I have a background in websites and online marketing so offered to help the Friends of Holywells Park to update their website. It was quickly decided that the website was built in an out-of-date format, was difficult for non-technical people to edit and it would be much better to start again and build a brand new website.

It was decided that the best website platform to use was "Wordpress" which is free software and relatively easy for non-technical people to understand. It is also very widely used and suitable for the type of website that was required by the Friends.

We planned the website around topics such as events, news, an online gallery and the history of the park. These were straightforward pages to set-up with content migrated from the old site plus new text and especially many more pictures.

There were two areas where we needed some technical support. Firstly we wanted to embed the Twitter feed so that when we updated our Twitter account the latest Tweets appeared on the homepage. The second issue was getting the park opening times to appear automatically on the website. The opening times vary during year depending on the daylight hours. This feature is something that other parks in the area don't have but we felt it was very important to have this updated daily.

In the calendar year 2017 the website had around 5,000 visitors who viewed over 11,000 pages. Many people have commented how much better event attendance has been in 2017 than in previous years. For example, there was an evening 'bat walk' in the park in August which had in earlier years barely attractive more than 40 people but in 2017 had over 150 attendees, many of whom were families from the local area.

Events are of course promoted on notice boards in the park but this does not inform people who are not regular visitors. This is where the website, supported by active Facebook and Twitter social media sites, really helps grow awareness of the park and attract new visitors.

I suppose the biggest contribution of the website, supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Big Lottery Fund is to help get large numbers of people visiting the park and coming to appreciate what a valuable and unique space it is."

3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.3. DEVELOP A SERIES OF LEAFLETS

The project developed a series of guided walk leaflets for Holywells Park providing information of its wildlife, trees, heritage, and health and wellbeing package. The leaflets complement the newly developed trails around the park and health and wellbeing activities.

The leaflets are informative and educational containing a map showing trails around the park. The leaflets highlight the location and provide information on specific points of interest relating to each leaflet topic. At each point of interest an interpretation board is located or the user can access augmented reality on a smart device using an app. The augment reality (AR)

allows the user to gain further information on the specific trails.

The augmented reality works by downloading an app on to your smart device. The app reads images on the interpretation board or through GPS and communicates more information for the user via their smart device. The information is presented in a variety of ways including video, photos and text.


The AR icon on the board indicates to the user that the board is interactive. The AR technology will be discussed later in the report within Outcome 2: Conserving the Heritage Value of the Park.

Heritage Leaflet

The Heritage Trail leaflet guides the user around the parks key heritage points of interest. At each point of interest there is an interpretation board providing information and compliment with augment reality.

The leaflet was designed in-house and follows the heritage interpretation boards around the park that were developed by UCS heritage students and volunteer Adrian Howlett, a local historian expert.

The augmented reality uses the Aurasma app. with instructions of how to download Aurasma on the back of the leaflet.









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Wildlife Trail

The Wildlife leaflet guides the users around the Wildlife Trail. The trail was designed by Ipswich Borough Council's Wildlife Team and consists of nine interpretation boards that display key wildlife features of the park.

The leaflet was designed in-house and follows the wildlife interpretation boards around the park that were developed by the IBC Ranger Team and Cevo and designed in house.

There are nine points of interest highlighting the mosaic of habitats and associated species within the park. At each point of interest there is an interpretation board complimented by AR technology.

The AR works as a multiple choice quiz aimed at Key Stage 1 – 3. Each point of interest offers the user 3 questions concerning that boards topic.

Tree Trail

The Tree Trail leaflet is one of the most popular leaflets that the project has produced. In the life of the project the leaflet has had a print run of 1,500 leaflets.

The leaflet guides the user around the park highlighting 24 trees of interest, complimented with AR technology.

The AR employs GPS mapping allowing the user to identify and approach trees on the trail. When the user has identified the specific tree on the trail a text and audio description of the tree are given through the app.


Historic Photo Trail


The Historic Photo Trail leaflet is a unique leaflet for the park. The leaflet navigates the user around an augmented historic reality of the park.

The leaflet contains a map and information presenting 28 points of interest At each point the user will be able to view a historic image of the park using an app and smart device.

Instructions of how to download the app and a QR code that takes the user to the photo trail is provided on the back of the leaflet.

Health and Wellbeing

The Health and Wellbeing leaflet provides information to the park user regarding opportunities of exercise and activities around the park that have been achieved through the project.

The activities include:

Orienteering

The Orienteering leaflet was developed and produced in partnership with the Suffolk Orienteering Club. The leaflet provides a specially produced orienteering map of Holywells Park along with a legend explaining the symbols and colours, telling the user how to use the three courses within the park.

The Suffolk Orienteering Club volunteered their time developing the leaflet, it was designed and printed inhouse.

The Orienteering leaflet has been well received by park users especially on the Family Fun Active Day in the park where lots of individuals took part in orienteering. This is great publicity for the course and the park with returning users.

1.4 EVENT POSTERS AND LEAFLETS

Over the life of the project, the park has produced a plethora of leaflets promoting events and activities at the park. These events will be discussed later in the report. The leaflets have worked extremely well in attracting a wide and diverse audience to the park. Preproject, the park hosted a minimal number of small bespoke events mostly organised by the Friends of Holywells Park.

The park now hosts a wide range of events and activities in-house and by external organisations and promoters. With the promotion of Holywells Park as an event venue it has been found that more and more external organisations are contacting the park enquiring about the possibility of using it as an event venue.

The project initially produced an annual leaflet listing all events being held at the park complemented by individual leaflets for each event. In 2016 Ipswich Borough Council made the decision to reduce its ecological footprint and decided where possible to go paperless. This changed the projects promotional style and engaged heavily with social media and the IBC website.

The project also created a website for the Friends of Holywells Park. It was found that these communication tools reached a far wider audience than leaflets promoting the parks events. This being said, the project continued to print a reduced number of leaflets and posters for promotion within the park and surrounding area such as libraries.

The distribution of leaflets have been at Holywells Park Reception, local libraries and sport centres, GP practices, Tourist Information office and local businesses and partnership organisations.

1.5 WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH IPSWICH BUSES

The project has worked in partnership with local Councillors and Ipswich Buses to ensure Holywells Park is better advertised on public transport passing the park. Buses display Holywells Park as a destination on the front of the vehicles which helps promote Holywells as a stop and aids bus users with the best route option.

All park promotion materials highlight bus routes to the park and display a link to Ipswich Buses web address for bus timetables. The Stable Block reception displays bus timetable leaflets and contact details on the electronic visual display unit. The Ipswich Borough Council Holywells Park website has a link to Suffolk Onboard https://www.suffolkonboard.com/buses/ which displays the latest bus timetables to the park and the Friends of Holywells Park website has a link to Ipswich Buses time tables and route maps http://holywellspark.org.uk/park-opening-times/


1.6 PEDESTRIAN LINKS WITH IPSWICH WATERFRONT AND HOLYWELLS PARK

A target for the project was to work with the Council's Planning Department and Councillors to increase awareness of Holywells Park to Waterfront users and promote walking to the park. The project has developed pedestrian links with Ipswich Waterfront to Holywells Park. Ipswich Waterfront is set around Ipswich's historic dock which has undergone a regeneration project including a marina, college, university, bars and restaurants. The Waterfront is just 1km away from Holywells Park which is to become the Waterfront park. Directional signage and a more pedestrian-friendly approach to the park from the Waterfront has been designed and implemented.

The project has also worked with the local car park Athena Hall, located at the Waterfront to elevate parking issues for the park. The car park is heavily promoted as a convenient place to park if visiting the park. All promotional material for the park has the strapline:

Visitors are advised to use public transport or use the car park at Athena Hall off Duke Street, which is only a few minutes' walk from the Myrtle Road entrance to the park. This car park charges 70p per hour, £2 after 2pm for the remainder of the day Monday - Friday and £2.50 all day Saturdays and Sundays.

Working with the car park the project has installed to information boards next to the ticket pay machine and the exit of the car park to give users directions to the park.









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

The park has worked with the Arts and Entertainment Team to recognise and advertise Holywells Park through events and activities that link up with events held at the Waterfront. This will include guided nature and heritage walks from the Waterfront to Holywells Park on the Maritime Festival weekend in August, an event attracting 45,000 people. Events and activities at the park are also advertised in Waterfront Life, a weekly resident's magazine.

The project has worked with partner organisations such as 'Stepping Out in Suffolk' and 'ActivLives'. Both organisations promote health and wellbeing and run regular Health walks and Nordic walking sessions from the Waterfront to Holywells Park and vice versa. This has also brought business to the café, reception and Green Bike Project based at the newly renovated Stable Block.

1.7 PARK ENTRANCE BOARDS

The project designed and installed information maps at all park entrances showing where you are, bus stops, bus routes, responsible car parking, park opening times and key features within the park. The boards aided in increasing the number of visitors using entrances within the park other than the Cliff Lane entrance.

Historically Cliff Lane entrance was the entrance mainly used to access the park, due to a small car park located within the park. As part of stakeholder and design team meetings the project made the decision to close this car park for health and safety reasons, allowing only permit holders such as residents, staff, Holywells Park Bowls Club and the Friends of Holywells Park to use the facility. Blue Badge holders have full access to the car park as well as pre-arranged event and activities.

The new entrance boards have promoted the different park entrances especially Bishops Hill and Myrtle Road that link up with the Waterfront and car parking facilities.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.8 TRIM TRAIL

As part of the projects Health and Wellbeing package, Trim Trail exercise equipment was purchased and installed as a circuit around the park offering physical activity for the whole community.

At the start of the Trim Trail a large board shows the route through the park and where each of nine items of equipment is located with individual signs for each activity, pictorially explaining how to use them, and suggested repetitions for different abilities. This trail is also promoted in the park's Health and Wellbeing leaflet and on the IBC website. The trail and equipment was designed with Ipswich gyms and park users such as British Military Fitness and Buggy Fitness.

The equipment and signage cost £7,418. It was decided Volunteer Rangers had a very wide skill base and would be competent with installation of the equipment together with volunteers providing skill and labour. A saving of £2,500 on installation fee was made.

The Trim Trail has been very well received and is used by the park community including all age groups, BAME groups and organised fit clubs. This was shown by the visitor observation surveys conducted in the park. IBC park employees have been told by members of the public that by using the Trim Trail they have given up their gym membership as the facility is so good.



1.9 HEALTH WALKS

Working in partnership with 'Live Well Suffolk' and 'ActivLives' the project developed a programme of Health Walks at Holywells Park. Health Walks are low impact, guided walks that enable you to increase or maintain your levels of physical activity in a supportive, sociable environment.

The health walks are a great success and have attracted all target audiences:

- GP and physiotherapist referrals
- Heart or stroke patients, minor mental health, low self-esteem, early retirement or redundancy bereavement, diabetics and obese.
- Over 45s
- BAME groups
- Single adults
- Local residents
- Waterfront residents

The benefits of the health walks are feeling revitalising, giving more energy, reducing stress and improving sleep, keeping heart 'strong', reducing blood pressure and helping manage weight.

The health walks run every two weeks within the park or starting at Ipswich Waterfront and ending in the park. After the walk the participants meet up and socialise in the Stable Block café. The health walks have an attendance of mixed gender and abilities of approximately 15 to 20 participants per session.

The project allowed a cost of £250 to purchase specific equipment for the walks including:

- Pedometers £50
- Blood pressure monitors £100
- Hi-vis tabards £20
- Stopwatches £50
- Pulse monitors £30

Working with the project's partner organisation the equipment is made available and supplied by them which saved costs to the project.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.10 NORDIC WALKING

The project has developed a training programme of Nordic Walking at Holywells Park in partnership with ActivLives.

Introduced in 1933 in Finland, people found cross country skiers were fitter in summer than in winter, because they were using their ski poles to move across land with no snow, so walking instead of skiing, which was improving their general fitness, strengthening muscles and improving their heart rates.

The poles used today are lightweight to enable all age groups; particularly older people enjoy a new stability, giving the confidence to walk at a good pace, without the fear of falling. The poles are strapped on, even allowing arthritis sufferers to take part. The project purchased 10 sets of poles for the park training programmes at a cost of £1,120.

The ActivLives training sessions are run for beginners and intermediates that comprise of a six week course. The take up for the sessions has been very successful with around six people per training session. When the poles are not being used for the training sessions park reception staff hire them out for a small deposit.











3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.11 MEASURED MILE

As part of the park's Health and Wellbeing package the project has created two 'Measured Mile' routes around the park. This allows the user to measure their fitness level regularly to find out if they are making progress. This one-mile walking test measures your aerobic (cardiovascular) fitness level based on how quickly one is able to walk a mile at submaximal (moderate) exercise intensity.

The park has two routes; the Blue route, taking in the flatter surface paths of the park for less able users and the Yellow route, the park circuit taking in the woodland, slopes and hills.

The board provides the user with male and female agerelated rating charts. Scoring will be age-adjusted standards (listed in minutes and seconds) for men and women, based on information collected from the Cooper Institute, American Council on Exercise and other sources. The age-adjusted standards range from poor to excellent helping the user with accurate information of their improvement.

The Measured Mile is used by independent fit clubs and personal trainers, health walks and Nordic walking and general park users.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.12 TAI CHI AND QI GONG

The project ran two Tai Chi sessions in the park. The first sessions ran in 2013 before the capital works were completed in 2015. The group used outside space next to the ponds. Unfortunately, the teacher left the UK to return to Hong Kong and the project had to find another teacher.

Due to the 2013/14 winter approaching and the major capital works being undertaken in the park it was decided to wait until spring 2015 when the capital works would be completed and the newly renovated Victorian conservatory and performance area would be available to hold the sessions.

The sessions recommenced on Saturday 18th April 2015 and were held in the conservatory and outside performance area. The sessions ran at a cost of £40 per two-hour session for the instructor's time. A promotional advertising campaign was launched to promote the Tai Chi using the local press, social media, IBC website and posters around the park, local libraries and sport centres.

The park charged individuals £4 per session to be competitive with other Tai Chi classes in the area. Initially, there was a small take up of customers though numbers gradually increased to around 10 individuals per session. This covered the cost of the instructor which was the aim in order to make the sessions sustainable post project life time. Unfortunately, the number of customers declined making the classes unsustainable and it was decided to end them.

In total the project spent £2,820 for the instructor which bought in £1,106 in course fees. The project has been unable to find another instructor willing to run the classes at the time of writing.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.13 GREEN GYM

The project had a budget of £12,000 with the aim to develop the concept of Green Gyms. The gyms would be led by experienced leaders undertaking a range of practical projects, giving the opportunity to tackle physical work in the outdoors.

The funding was used to work in partnership with The Conservation Volunteers to gain accreditation for the scheme. Most Green Gyms have been established by Conservation Volunteers, where they employ an officer to coordinate the scheme. The officer would work with your organisation - and other local partners - to devise a programme of environmental activity and to run regular Green Gym sessions according to Conservation Volunteers' quality standards (including health and safety). They would recruit participants into the scheme via local health services and through wider promotional activity.

Depending upon the target audience, the Conservation Volunteers Officer would aim to develop a community group within two or three years. This is where volunteers take on the long-term running of the programme. It is achieved through training and mentoring local volunteers so they develop the skills and confidence to organise the scheme independently of The Conservation Volunteers.

It was soon realised the project was already achieving the Green Gym concept through employment of a Volunteer Leader from the Green Light Trust. The Green Light Trust is a local social enterprise that helps transform lives through nature, by bringing people together through projects that encourage enjoyment of being outdoors and protect the environment at the same time. The project employed the Volunteer Leader for 18 months. Within this time the project developed two volunteering groups: The Gardening Club and the Volunteer Rangers. These groups will be discussed in more detail later in this paper.

It was agreed with the project's Heritage Lottery Officer that the Green Gym concept was being met by other means which permitted the project to use the $\mathfrak{L}12,000$ allocated to the Green Gym on other beneficial projects for the park and its users.

3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.14 I-PLAY

The project installed an I-Play unit, revolutionary outdoor play equipment that is dynamic and innovatively designed in conjunction with a leading sports and health research company with the aim of breaking the cycle of sedentary activity resulting in rising childhood obesity.

Designed to attract and engage a user group which is more accustomed to playing computer games than participating in physical activity although the equipment can be used by all age groups and abilities. A wide range of unique activity switch designs are used to maximise muscle activation and ensure improvement of fine and gross motor skill development of a wide audience including wheelchair users. There are six games to choose from and an I-Play.

The project worked with the I-Play company and held two community play days in the park, the aim of increasing community engagement and fitness by holding I-Play events. The community day events were very successful introducing the new equipment into the park to the park audience.





1.15 ORIENTEERING COURSE

Within the park's Health and Wellbeing package the project developed and created an orienteering course at Holywells Park working in partnership with Suffolk Orienteering Club. The club uses the course weekly during daylight and the educational room for meetings and a community hub.

The project worked with the club to develop a course leaflet which is available from the park's reception and online. This allows the public and community groups to use the course which is also very popular on the park's activity days, especially the active Family fun day during the school summer holidays.

Clive Wilkinson, Lead Coach of Suffolk Orienteering Club comments: "The orienteering course in Holywells Park and associated leaflet provide a good introduction to the sport and has been used regularly by park visitors since its establishment. This is especially true at the activity days in the summer. It has provoked interest in the club from prospective members. It has also been used as a training a great asset for orienteering Club members on a regular basis.

3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.16 HERITAGE EVENTS

The project was successful in developing and delivering a wide range of heritage events and activities at the park. The events were aimed at all age groups and abilities. Audiences that attend these events were;

- Educational learners
- BAME groups
- Over 45s
- Access groups
- Families
- Day visitors
- Single adults
- Local residents
- Waterfront residents and audience
- Community groups
- Youth groups

The benefits for people of the Heritage Days are family learning and engagement, a greater understanding of the park's heritage, community engagement, heritage education, health and wellbeing and family participation.

The events included:

- IBC Museum outreach days about Victorian life and the social structure of large Victorian estates
- Heritage Days including outreach days from the Cobbold History Family Trust and the Gainsborough Society
- Willow-weaving courses
- History walks Holywells Magical History Tour designed and led by a volunteer, Adrian Howlett
- Open days of Ice House
- Conservatory open days

The budget to develop and deliver heritage events was $\mathfrak{L}3000$. Due to the Cevo establishing good working relationships and partnerships within the local heritage sector, the heritage events were delivered at a minimal cost with the final budget spent of $\mathfrak{L}73$. Below are details of some of the events held at the park.

Adrian Howlett, who leads the park's heritage walks, comments:

"Holywells Park: Bring the Magic Back - A Management Plan" thesis was completed in 2004. I was a my thesis for "Holywells (Park) at the time and at a meeting it was decided I could do a walk using facts from but took over two hours to complete. For this first walk I had an assistant and we were both in period fancy success but made shorter for the next year and I have given walks every year since. The content has has stopping points where I talk about each of the main Cobbold owners in chronological order.

Over the years there have usually been two walks per year but I think one year there was as many as six. The number of people on the walk has varied from 8 to 40. This year is the 13th year it has been running."







WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.17 **DEVELOP A RANGE OF NATURAL** HERITAGE EVENTS/ACTIVITIES WITHIN **HOLYWELLS PARK**

The project has provided an overwhelming array of events and activities regarding the park's natural heritage, run by many individuals, volunteers, staff, community groups and organisations.

These include:

- Bug hunts
- Pond dipping
- Bat walks
- Moth Night
- Butterfly walks
- Dawn chorus
- Wildflower walks
- Bird walks
- Bird ringing
- Fungi •
- Tree identification
- Reptiles
- Photography
- Bee keeping
- Suffolk Wildlife Trust 'Watch' group
- Orchard Open days
- Geology walks

1.18 **DEVELOP A PROGRAMME "HOLYWELLS FAMILY FUN DAYS**"

One of the main targets for the project was to attract a larger, wider diverse audience of families and young people into the park. The project developed a programme, "Holywells Family Fun Days" activities, to be held each Wednesday of the school holidays to entice customers away from the play area and into the rest of the park. The events have now been running for five years and continuing this year (2018) past the life of the project adding to the project's legacy.

The aims of the fun days are for families and the wider community to have a greater understanding and knowledge of Holywells Park's heritage and environment.

The fun days met the following aims within Holywells Park HLF bid in relation to HLF outcomes:

- To increase involvement in the park by reaching out to the wider community and actively promoting planned activities encouraging a strong sense of ownership.
- To foster a greater understanding and appreciation of the park and it's potential for learning, and to build voluntary capacity to support this.
- To encourage use of the park for formal and informal learning for all ages and abilities.
- To expand on the current range of events in the park to appeal to a wide section of the community.









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

THE FAMILY FUN DAY EVENTS INCLUDED:

Wildlife Day



This event celebrates the park's natural heritage, introducing wildlife and environmental topics to families and young children of the local and wider communities.

Ipswich Borough Council Wildlife Team, Friends of Holywells Park and conservation organisations ran a series of park events including pond dipping, bug hunts, wildlife walk and wildlife art. There is also an educational workshop of seeing and interacting with live animals, to fascinate, inspire and entertain children of all ages. Children are given the opportunity to not only view different reptiles, amphibians, invertebrate mammals and birds species but also to touch and handle them.

Heritage Day



Holywells Park has a lot of history, from the medieval Bishops Fort, the Cobbold family dynasty and the Ipswich brewery industry. The heritage days involved guided walks around the park, historic themed fancy dress competition, a display of working historic crafts, exhibitions and demonstrations from the Cobbold Family History Trust and the Gainsborough Trust, and actors dressed in period costume around the park

depicting real life events from the Victorian era that have occurred within the park.

A great accomplishment at an event was engaging with the local community to repaint Thomas Gainsborough's Holywells Park 1748 – 1750 depiction of the park. The painting was loaned to the Wolsey Art Gallery at Christchurch Mansion, where it was hung next to the original Gainsborough as a community outreach project. The gallery held an opening of the exhibition where the Mayor unveiled the community art. The picture is now hanging in the café in the renovated Stable Block at the park.

Active Day



This is a day promoting health and wellbeing activities in the park. Partners include Dance East, Ipswich Borough Council sport centres, Suffolk Orienteering Club, Livewellsuffolk, ActivLives, and Ipswich Town Football Community Trust. Activities include Jumpers for Goal posts, Game On, Measured Mile walk, health walks, Nordic walking, Tai Chi, martial arts, yoga, dance classes, climbing wall, orienteering, health checks, football training with ITFC and events put on by our sport centres.

The project also worked with the Bangladeshi Support Centre and the Ipswich and Suffolk Indian Association to break down barriers helping to engage and involve these cultural and ethnic groups.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Family Fun Day

Family Day provides a great day of good old fashioned family fun at Holywells Park. Entertainment and activities for the event include donkey rides, attendance from emergency services including an ambulance, police car, tractor and fire engine, solar projection with the Orwell Astronomical Society, face painting, childrens rides and inflatables.

Petting Zoo



By far the most popular Family Fun Day event. Families have the chance to come to Holywells Park and meet lots of different types of animals. This event includes a farm yard petting zoo where you will encounter farm animals which will educate and entertain giving a truly memorable, fun experience. There are also a reptile and insect tent where children can handle exotic snakes, lizards and insects, a static display showing birds of prey and the traditional heritage breed of Suffolk Punch horse, along with face painting and making animal face masks.

Movie Day



Movie Days were a first for Holywells Park and an event the project wanted to build on. The Movie Day is the most expensive Family Fun Day to host due to the screen hire costs. Movie Days showed children's cartoons with an environmental theme for example "Over the Hedge" from DreamWorks animation. At each movie day there were two showings and the event was accompanied with fairground rides and refreshments.

The Movie Day attracted the attention of the Outdoor Cinema Company, Popup Pictures Ltd. The Project started working with Popup Pictures to host three cinema events on a Thursday, Friday and Saturday evening in the park on an annual basis. These events proved extremely popular and the project made an arrangement with Popup Pictures to put on an afternoon show. The agreement has meant the Movie Day is future proofed and will continue on after the project has been completed.

The events were very successful in attracting a bigger family audience with a wider diversity background into the park. Each event attracted well over 1,000 individuals.





3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

The project and events team held public meetings to address the residents' issues and concerns about parking in neighbouring streets which resulted in:

- The production and implementation of the Holywells Park Traffic Management Plan https://www.ipswich.gov.uk/sites/default/files/travel planfinaldraftupdate2016.pdf
- Working in partnership with Cliff Lane Primary School to use its playground as a car park for all events if required.
- The implementation of Traffic Regulation Orders by Suffolk County Council prohibiting parking in specific areas in the vicinity of the park
- The promotion of Athena Hall car park on all park literature
- The promotion of all bus routes to the park on all park literature
- The promotion of sustainable transport including walking and cycling to the park with the availability of new bike stands at the park.

These measures have alleviated parking issues on local residential streets and IBC no longer receives complaints concerning parking issues within the vicinity of the park while hosting events.

1.19 WORK WITH AND PROMOTE SWT WATCH GROUP DAYS AT HOLYWELLS PARK



Suffolk Wildlife Trust's Wildlife Watch Group is aimed at children who want to get involved on a regular basis, they meet outdoors once a month to learn about and discover natural history.

The project has provided extra resources for the Wildlife Watch such as storage facilities, outdoor classrooms, use of the Victorian conservatory and education room as well as a safer working environment which has enabled the group to grow attracting a wider audience from the local community and further afield.

With the continued success of the Wildlife Watch, the Holywells Park HLF Project supported an application by SWT to the HLF to fund a project called Closer to Nature aimed at involving teenagers in natural history within Ipswich. Holywell Park was used as the launch site for the project and SWT was able to build its audience to have events and activities in the wider landscape of Ipswich.

Lucy Sheppard, the Closer to Nature Officer, said of the project:

"Holywells Park has been instrumental in helping Suffolk Wildlife in Ipswich with our work through both the Closer to Nature project and also one of Suffolk Wildlife Trust's junior branches, Wildlife Watch. The team at Holywells Park has helped us in providing a space where we can deliver our sessions and helped to promote the group. The outdoor classrooms and other educational facilities developed through the HLF Project have greatly helped SWT to promote and hold events at the park. Numbers of attendees have risen steadily over the past couple of years and we have gone from having one regular attendee to fully booked sessions with people booking up until December 2018 to ensure they can attend our sessions. Our relationship and partnership has been essential for Suffolk Wildlife Trust in Ipswich and as mentioned above has helped us to develop groups and sessions. The feedback we receive from Wildlife Watch is always extremely positive with parents saying "we look forward to the Saturday Wildlife Watch sessions each month and it's so great as it's not just for the "we look forward to the Saturday Wildlife Watch sessions each month and it's so great as it's not just for the idds, we love it too." One parent who hasn't been surrounded by wildlife as a child has said "I am now learning so much as an adult in a fun and relaxed way alongside my child". The children always have fun with one child in our last session saying "the best thing about Wildlife Watch is that we can get our hands dirty."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.20 HOLI FESTIVAL

Within the delivery phase of the project the Cevo started to work with the Ipswich and Suffolk Indian Association (ISIA) and the Sikh Gurdwara investigating ways to break down barriers and attract the Indian community into the park. The projects initial research found 0.3% of the audience was of Indian descent. The local census data in 2012 revealed that within the local population individuals of Indian decent represented 2% of the population. This being so the Indian community became a target BAME group for the project.

From our initial discussions with ISIA it was decided Holywells Park would hold a Vaisakhia and Holi Festival in 2014 with the aim to hold Diwali festival in 2015. Unfortunately the Vaisakhia and Diwali festivals did not come to fruition due to several factors including weather and park conditions, commitment and resources from ISIA. This allowed the project to focus on the Holi Festival which was the first ever Holi Festival for Suffolk. Holi has become a very successful event and has run every year since 2013.

The Holi Festival has Indian street food stalls, live Indian singers and dancers, community stalls from the ISIA and the Bangladeshi Support centre, a bonfire to break and eat coconuts over and throw seed onto and the throwing of Rangoli powder over each other. The event

attracts a diverse audience of 5000 individuals, supported by the ISIA and the Indian community. The success of the event has meant its sustainability and continuation after the Delivery Phase of the project with IBC and ISIA continuing to support and hold the event.

Working in partnership with the Heritage Lottery Fund and IBC the event is planned and delivered in a professional manner to meet the agreed objectives and budget.





Poli Mohan, ISIA Chair writes:

"Holi" is celebrated worldwide by Hindus and non-Hindus. An ideal outdoor festival, enjoyed by smearing people with colour and throwing coloured powder around in an atmosphere of good humour. Playing Holi gives people opportunity to forget all differences and indulge in unadulterated fun. It has traditionally been celebrated in high spirit without any distinction of cast, creed, colour, race, status or gender. It is an occasion when sprinkling coloured powder or coloured water on each other breaks all barriers of discrimination, integrating communities and creating great community cohesion."








3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.21 WORLD PICNIC

The world picnic concept, a one-off event, of holding a "World Picnic at Holywells Park" with many different cultures and communities sharing world foods with the anticipation that this event will attract 2,000 visitors to the park developed into an amazing mini festival which ran for three years with the aim of continuing the



event after the project is complete.

The event is held in the newly renovated Walled Garden and Victorian Conservatory on the performance area. A stage is constructed for the event performers which includes, belly dancing, Caribbean steel drum band, Salsa dance troop, Morris dancers, South American music, Spanish flamenco, Romanian gypsy folk band and a local Ska band, The Downsetters which headlined.

Outside the performance area in front of the renovated Stable Block a selection of world food street stalls including Indian, Thai, Spanish, and Caribbean were available. The Stable Café was also involved selling English fare and ice creams.

The event attracted a large, diverse audience of mixed abilities. The acts that performed also encouraged audience participation which encourages all communities and ages to become involved and learn new dances from around the world.

1.22 BANGLADESHI PICNICS

The aim of the Bangladeshi picnics was to work with the Bangladeshi Support Centre (BSC) to develop and implement events/activities to attract the Bangladeshi community into the park providing health and wellbeing opportunities. The 2010 Marmot Review found that Bangladeshi and Pakistani people are more likely to report bad or very bad health compared to the general population.

The project encountered many barriers trying to engage with the community encouraging them into the park. Some of the barriers the project faced were custom and traditions for the separation of males and females in social settings. Appendix 4 is a report completed by the BSC about their partnership working with the project.

Shayra Begum, Centre Manager for Bangladeshi Support Centre, writes: The project overcame these barriers by the Cevo meeting with the community giving presentations and an introduction to the park, organising separate events and activities for male and females and employing no dog areas on days of the events.

Bangladeshi Support Centre has worked in partnership with Holywells Park since its refurbishment on various occasions. This partnership working provided opportunities for clients from our Carers Project, Bangladeshi Elders Project, Supplementary School children and their families and many others to enjoy not only the beauty of the park but to take part in activities including pond dipping, outdoor bowling, bird nest making, Tai Chi, football tournament, and walks.

BSC clients have also had the opportunity to find out more about the history of the park through talks and BSC has been able to promote its taking a stall at the annual Holi Festival.

Helen, a performer from the Hawi School of Dance, writes:

"To us Eat the Beat Festival was an excellent event to bring communities together, happened in a peaceful and historical area well organized with great comradeship between performers."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?









Approximately 700 people took part in the various activities provided by the partnership working, many of whom did not know of the parks existence but are now regular visitors. Event and activities involved

- Community Picnic Fun Day
- Exhibition of Curry and Culture Heritage Project
- Cycling proficiency tests and bike workshop
- Lawn Bowls taster sessions
- Nordic Walking
- Tai Chi
- Pond dipping and bug hunts
- Kabbadi

More than 300 people attended a big community picnic at Holywells Park today - organised by Ipswich's Bangladeshi Support Centre.







WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.23 **CHOPIN IN THE PARK**

It was decided the project needed to engage with the Ipswich Polish community due to the increasing Polish population within Ipswich and close to Holywells Park. The Cevo met with the Polish community leader of Ipswich and discussed ideas of how to attract the community into the Park.

It was decided for the project to engage with the Polish community the Park would host a Chopin Recital within the newly renovated and restored Walled Garden and Victorian conservatory making use of the outdoor performance area with dignitaries from the Polish community being invited.

The event was a huge success attracting approximately 300 ticketed attendees. The event promotion material was printed in both English and Polish. The Polish Community Leader and Mayor of Ipswich attended along with Consul Ines Czajczynska - Da Costa representing the Embassy of the Republic of Poland.



Pablo Lopes, pianist for the evening writes:

"It is with great fondness that I recall playing an evening of Chopin music at Holywells Park in August 2016. I had never before heard of the park or of its history, however, I was greatly struck by the beautiful landscaped gardens before me, I could tell immediately that it was going to be a wonderful

When the piano was ready for me and I started rehearsing, after a few minutes' people and children started wandering in, presumably attracted by the sounds of the piano being played. They stood watching and listening to me. It was amazing to see so many children standing absolutely still watching me play and listening so attentively, I guess they had never seen a pianist live so this was truly fascinating, what an amazing opportunity for them to see a real person making music instead of a picture on a screen which is the norm these days.

When it was time to begin the concert I was amazed to see that it was absolutely full of people, just about every seat was taken. It was a wonderful evening which I'll never forget, the setting was absolutely stunning, and the weather was perfect for an outdoor concert, coupled with the fact that many people and children were introduced to culture and music which was performed live."

3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.24 WILDLIFE WHISPERER

The Wildlife Whisperer idea was to develop the concept and implementation of strategically locating wildlife cameras to be installed around the park relaying footage into the Stable Block café/reception area.

This concept was delivered with the IBC Wildlife Team and an outside consultant. The project worked in line with the main contractors of the project and laid Cat 5 cables for the wildlife cameras within service trenches dug for the new services for the restoration of the Stable Block, Victorian Conservatory and Leaf Yard complex.

The cameras for the wildlife whisper include:

- 4 nest boxes
- 2 swift boxes
- 1 mammal box
- 1 tawny owl box
- 1 PTZ camera
- 1 seasonal tank camera for aquatic or reptiles or caterpillars

The camera project has been very successful and a great asset in the café. The cameras have filmed a wide variety of wildlife from nesting blue tits, small mammals, nesting stock doves and numerous species from the PTZ camera on bird feeders.

John, IBC Wildlife Ranger, writes:

"The facilities created during the Heritage Lottery funded project have provided a real opportunity to interest, educate and at times amuse the many visitors to the Stable Block. A number of wildlife cameras have been installed which provide something of interest to a wide variety of different visitors. They have become a real attraction for café users. During spring and summer nesting birds provide lots of interest and during autumn and winter a feeding station camera shows footage recorded earlier in the year. There is lots of that.

Currently footage that has been collected is visible in the café and has proved very popular with users and may even have helped in increasing the number of café visitors. The longer term aim is to make the footage from the cameras available to view via a website."

1.25 DEVELOP EVENTS FOR AN OLDER GENERATION

The projects initial visitor observation surveys revealed that the park was not attracting a large audience from the older generation. The older generation became one of the parks target audiences and the Activity Plan developed a programme of activities to attract older people into the park. The project also started to work with local community groups and residential homes that cater for the older generation.

Talks and coffee mornings

The project ran a series of talks and coffee mornings in the educational room which is part of the café. The talks ranged from the restoration of the park, the heritage of the park and wildlife. These talks were requested from community groups or planned events. The talks were always well attended of 20 – 30 individuals (30 individuals is the capacity of the room). Community groups including The University of the Third Age, Top Timers (a local library group), Holme Oak Residential Home (located at the park entrance) and local church groups attended the sessions.

Picnics

The project worked with Top Timers and Holme Oak residential Home arranging activities in the park with a picnic in the Walled Garden. If needed, the project provided transport and easy vehicular access to locations within the park for less mobile individuals to attend the events. One great benefit was cross working with the two groups so individuals could see old friends or make new friends.

Guided walks

A series of guided walks were held about the heritage and wildlife of the park. The routes were adjusted from other walks to avoid steep gradients and unsurfaced footpaths making them accessible for all. Outside organisations including the RSPB, Butterfly Conservation and the IBC tourism team held regular walks at the park to cater for an older audience.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?



Tea dance

The newly renovated performance area and Victorian Conservatory became the ideal location to hold tea dances. The project employed two dance instructors to hold regular events which were attended by 20 – 30 individuals per event. The project worked in partnership with the Stables Café to provide tea and cake.

Exercise

The project provide many health and wellbeing activities for the older generation. These included:

- Measured Mile walks
- Health Walks
- Nordic walking
- Tai Chi
- Yoqa
- Tea dance

Art events

The project has held a number of art events from willow weaving, drawing and painting and knitting workshops. This led to the creation of Holywells Creative, a group of ex art students from the University of Suffolk, that now lead regular art event and exhibitions in the park. Holywells Creative as a group will be discussed later in the report. Holywells Creative lead monthly Sketch and Stroll events around the park which are attend by a wide audience including the older generation and less mobile individuals.

Gardening Club

The Gardening Club has provided an amazing opportunity to enable gentle outdoor exercise for the older generation of all abilities. The club also provides a wonderful social community for the attendees with common interests. The Gardening Club will be discussed in more detail later in the report.

Britta Ambler, from Top Timers Gainsborough Library, writes:

"The over 60's group at Gainsborough Community Library have been very lucky to benefit from entertaining and informative talks about Holywells Park. We have also enjoyed a lovely tour round the park after the restoration of the staples and the conservatory. During the last couple of years several of Top Time ladies have joined the afternoon tea dances, meeting friends and making new friends.

Many of the health and well being activities were run for free by outside organisations such as Stepping Out in Suffolk, Activitives or IBC staff and volunteers. This gave the project a large saving and enable to the project to purchase a defibrillator and lockable cabinet that is now located on the exterior wall of the Stable Block. The location was consulted with and advised by the HLF and IBC Conservation Heritage Officer. At time of writing the defibrillator has been deployed twice aiding in saving lives."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.26 PROMOTION OF THE PERFORMANCE AREA

The project developed strategies to promote the performance area to theatre companies, local drama groups and educational establishments.

The project produced and promoted an information leaflet detailing the specifications of the performance area not only to performance groups but also to potential exhibitors and event management and promotion companies. Strategies involved using the local press, IBC Events team, website and social media, FoHP website and social media and emails. The promotion was very successful with a large variety of performances, events and activities taking place on the performance area including:

- Outdoor theatre
- Music events
- Community events
- Health and wellbeing activities
- Exhibitions and fairs

1.27 EVENT PACK

The project was to develop and implement a downloadable pack for event organisers at Holywells Park including terms and conditions. It was found that the Events team already held a corporate event pack and this was used for event organisers at Holywells Park.

1.28 PROMOTION AND ADVERTISING OF EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES AT HOLYWELLS PARK

All events and activities at Holywells Park are promoted through a number of processes including printed materials, banners and social media. With the world becoming more environmentally aware it was decided to try and reduce printed materials and use method such as websites, digital displays, email distribution lists and social media. This not only reduces the projects environmental footprint but reaches a wider audience including teenagers and the older generation.

1.29 SUMMER EVENTS

An aim of the project was to work in partnership with the Arts and Entertainment Team to include and hold events at Holywells Park within Ipswich's summer programme.

Livvy Grant, from the Events team, writes:

"The HLF project allowed us to expand our events programme and put on a number of events that the public

For the first time we held an outdoor theatre event. We have worked with the theatre company the Pantaloons for a number of years but this was one of the first opportunities to show off the park to the public events of this style. The theatre event attracted an audience of 400 people who were able to enjoy this

As a result, Holywells Park is now included in our annual summer events programme and we hold a number of events in the park of all different styles and scales. The funding has allowed us to refurbish the park, allowing the surrounding community to attend events for free on their doorstep, something incredibly







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.30 FRIENDS OF HOLYWELLS PARK EVENTS

The friends of Holywells Park have held numerous events at the Park which included:

Scarecrow Day



Members of the public are invited into the orchard to make a scarecrow, enjoy homemade cakes and refreshments, storytelling, crafting, lawn games and face painting.

Welcome Spring



An event celebrating spring with numerous craft activities, planting seeds, making homes for wildlife, listening to springtime stories from the storyteller, and follow the trail of the Golden Hare which leads to his treasure!

Bat Walk

This is a very popular event which has become a bookable event only. The event is now limited to 50 places. The event entails a walk around the park at dusk with a bat expert identify bat species, their habitats and basic ecology. The project funded four bat detectors to aid the event.

Apple Day



This is the Friend's biggest annual event and celebrates Holywells Park Orchard. You can have a go at apple bobbin, pumpkin carving, longest apple peel, storytelling from the hammock, apple quiz, sales of honey and fruits from The Orchard and refreshments of soups, apple fritters and other apple products. The project provided food health and hygiene certificated training for the Friend's to enable them to produce and sell refreshments and Holywells Park honey.

1.31 THE REGENERATION OF THE STABLE BLOCK AND VICTORIAN CONSERVATORY

The projects main capital works were the regeneration of the Stable Block as a visitor and information centre with interpretation displays, a café, education room and the Victorian Conservatory as a multi-functional space.

The café and conservatory has become a hub for many events and activities and a social gathering place and the education room a space for meetings, talks and informal and formal education.

Items purchased for this space were:

- Display screen for wildlife cameras
- Display screen for park info
- Reception desk
- Shop shelving
- Display cabinet for park artefacts
- Leaflet display stands
- Furniture fo conservatory
- Discovery pen interactive interpretation board







WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

1.32 **EXTRA ACTIVITIES**

The project was successful in delivering all events and activities outlined in the Activity Plan and came in under budget. This allowed the project to use the under spend to continue to improve the parks fabric for hosting events and activities.

The success of the events that the project financed through the HLF Activity Plan attracted the attention of many outside event companies who in turn approached Holywells Park wanting to hold their own events in the park. These events not only brought a larger and wider audience into the park but also created income generation for the park.

These events and activities include:

The Nearly Festival

A weekend mini music festival with the ethos of family fun. The event had many tribute acts performing over the two days with a free Kid-Zone play area. The festivals have ran in the park for two consecutive years attracting 2,500 people to the event over the weekend.



Danny Banthorpe, the event organiser, writes:

"Holywells Park Ipswich Borough Council has worked in partnership with The Nearly Festival & Pop Up Pictures for the last three years delivering very successful events.

Holywells Park has been an integral part of the success of our Ipswich events and the management team have acted as a admirable ambassadors for Ipswich Borough council whilst helping us create our event experiences in the given green space on Myrtle Meadow.

Over the last three years, we have hosted nine nights of outdoor cinema and four festival days with a combined attendance of up to 10,000 people. The events have not only entertained the local community but given a platform for local businesses to showcase their services, employ local staff and for local charities to benefit too.

We hope the events have given more exposure to Holywells Park as the fantastic regeneration deserves to be seen and appreciated.

We work with many local authorities and in many green spaces and Holywells Park and the management team are up there with the best with great service and being so attentive to our specific needs."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Outdoor Cinema

As mentioned above, the park has hosted outdoor cinema events that have become very popular. The evening events attract 200-500 people to the park. The success of the event has led to the park working in partnership with the event organisers for the Holywells park Family Fun Movie Day event.

The project has been able to arrange the Family Fun Movie Day the day before the outdoor cinema at the park. This enables the event company to come in to the park a day early to set up and show a children's movie for the Fun Day at no cost to the park. Not only does this help the event company by setting up early but also provides promotion for the evening events in the park.

Noise of Art



Ben Osbourne, from Noise of Art, writes:

Not having been to Ipswich that much, I wasn't expecting to find a location like Holywells Park, but one day I stumbled across it. It's a great park in an unexpected location, so that was already great. Then we saw the area around the Conservatory and realised it is a great space for events too.

The team at Holywells were very easy to contact and also hugely proactive in helping us to put an event on. We ended up doing two events that were intended to bring a wider diversity of music into the local area, while encouraging local artists. For the first one we brought DJs such as Danny Rampling and Diesel/Xpress 2 into play alongside local bands. For the second we hosted Ipswich's first DJ day featuring a long line up of local DJs. Both events were well received.

Noise of Art is a music and cross platform art collective. We launched with the Tate and British Film Industry as partners and put on arenas at festivals such as Latitude and Big Chill. We are currently in talks with several Ipswich-based organisations hoping to return to do an event in the Holywells Park".









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Exterior light posts



To aid exiting after nightfall from the park at the Cliff Lane entrance five external light posts were installed. The Cliff Lane entrance is poorly lit and was a health and safety concern for attendees to evening park events. The lights work on a timer and come on when required and turn off after the event so are not all night potentially disturbing local residents. The lights are also a great asset to members of the public and staff when leaving the park in winter months.

Post and rail fence



From the Nacton Road entrance into the park was an old wire mesh fence for two hundred metres that acted as a barrier from the footpath to a very steep drop to Pond 1. The fence was dilapidated and in places not fit for purpose. On Monday 28th October St Jude's Storm hit Holywells Park and an ancient oak tree unfortunately was storm-felled and crushed some of the old fence line. That part of the fence line was replaced by post and rail. The park received several comments from the Friends of Holywells Park as well as members of the public about how good and in keeping the new part of fence line looked so it was decided to replace the entire length for aesthetic and health and safety reasons, especially exiting from the park at night after events.

Defibrillator



Due to the large increase in physical activities and an increased audience of the older generation to the park it was decided to purchase and install a defibrillator to the side of the Stable Block. The defibrillator is accessed via a code obtained from reception or by following the instructions on the box and calling a phone number. Since the box has been installed the defibrillator has been deployed twice.

Compost toilet



A compost toilet was purchased and installed in the orchard by volunteers. The toilet was procured to support events and activities in the orchard as it is some distance from the Stable Block or play area and if an someone required using the facilities they would probably not return to the orchard again due to the distance. This posed a problem with the orchard being increasingly used for Forest Schools and bush craft training events. The toilets are greatly appreciated by the Friends who manage the orchard and beehives within the orchard.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Holywells Bowls with Cliff Lane Primary School

The project worked with the Holywells Bowls Club and Cliff Lane Primary School developing introduction sessions of lawn bowls to school children. The sessions became very popular and the project purchased junior sized bowls for the school children to use more easily. Now during the bowling season the school sessions run weekly for the Year 6 students and have developed into a tournament.



Miss Chelsey King, Year 6 Teacher and Maths Leader of Cliff Lane Primary School, writes:

"Bowls is a great opportunity for our Year 6 children. They learn a new skill, develop further teamwork skills as well as good sportsmanship. It also provides an opportunity for us to build links with our local community.

By playing bowls with the club, the children learn how to work alongside senior bowls players. It exposes the children to a game which is not as popular for their age range. As the child friendly equipment is provided by the club, the children have to show respect for things that are not theirs and it demonstrates the commitment and passion the club has to continuing the positive relationship we are building between them and our school."

Val Reader, the Secretary for Holywells Bowls Club, writes:

"Holywells Bowls Club has been situated on the park for over 70 years and has seen a great good working relationship with park staff and the major changes that have taken place on the Wears and sold seen a great good working relationship with park staff and the major changes that have taken place on the

We are self-maintaining and our green has benefitted greatly from the upgrading of the surrounding areas. The restoration of the Orangery has given us a beautiful outlook and attracts a large number of visitors, this also helps to highlight the clubs existence.

As the park was restored some of the old materials were donated to the club, we have potential vandalism and have reused some paving slabs given to us to make our pathways.

Thanks to the support of the parks team who funded some junior bowls equipment we are able to offer the local primary school weekly bowls sessions throughout the summer. Fifty math's, exercise and team spirit and encourages interaction between the generations."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Way-marking finger posts

Six way-marking finger posts have been installed at all park entrances and key locations within the park. This has greatly benefitted new and old park users finding their way to locations around the park. It has especially aided attendees to events that are held in the park.

Sketch and Strolls

Sketch and Stroll events are run by Holywells Creative, a volunteer art group at Holywells Park. They run every second Sunday of the month and are well attended. Appendix 6 is a complete evaluation report of the work Holywells Creative has implemented at Holywells Park and testimonials from all participants of the group.



OUTCOME 2: CONSERVING AND ENHANCING THE HERITAGE VALUE OF THE PARK

2.1 THE STABLES AND TACK ROOM

The project developed artefacts and interpretation materials within the Stable Block showing how the stables were used, a display concerning the Cobbold brewing industry and to recreate the tack room displaying equine equipment which would have been used for the horse and carriages at the stable block.

The project worked closely with Heritage and Tourism students from the University of Suffolk to help develop the themes of the interpretation rooms. The project initially worked with three students with each student taking on an area; tack room, Stable 1 and Stable 2.

Noeleen Rowe, a student that developed part of the interpretation, writes:

"The aim of the project was to bring the stables back to life and show how they were once used. Using themes and interpreting the stable in the cultural traditions of Victorian life, the daily work of stable boy and use of products and tools.

Use of a motion detector on entry into the stables with a horse neighing, trotting and carriage sounds, adding to sensory experience. For authenticity of sight, smell and touch place on floor a wheelbarrow with hay, and in two mangers.

The display box inserted into the feed trough with various horses feed grains and pellets and oats dispenser with lids for health and safety. Visitor participation in naming the pony, making writing on tag, and hanging on hooks making the experience more enjoyable."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?


The exhibits and interpretation are visual, audio and tactile learning and includes:

Stable 1

This area is a representation of a working stable from the Victorian era. The stable was developed to be as interactive as possible for all ages and abilities. An interpretation board explains about Victorian stables

Within the stable there is a life size plastic pony that children are encouraged to groom and plait its mane and tail. Children are also encouraged to name the horse by writing a name on a card tag and hanging it in the stable so the pony can choose a name. Within the stable there are also dress-up clothes and tools of people that would have worked in and around the stables including stable boys, maids and groomsmen. This encourages a range of interactive learning about how Victorian stables worked.











3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

The Tack Room

The Tack Room was an important place run by the groomsman at the stables. The Tack Room is where the equipment (tack) was kept for the horses and carriages. The groomsman was the most important person in the stables. The project's aim was to bring the tack room alive with artefacts and tools that the groomsman would have used. The project purchased certain artefacts and worked in partnership with the Ipswich Museums Service that have loaned artefacts including horse and carriage reins, saddles, polishing equipment whips, a saddle horse and a tortoise belly burner that would have kept the room and tack warm in the winter months.

Due to the historic content of the tack room many of the artefacts are not accessible to tactile interpretation. It was decided the project would purchase two saddles at a low cost with no heritage worth to provide some interactive interpretation. The saddles sit on the saddle horse and children are encouraged to put on a apron and help polish the saddles for Mr and Mrs Cobbold.











3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Stable 2

It was decided that the second stable would be used to interpret the history of the Cobbold Brewery Industry, which in turn is why the people of Ipswich have Holywells Park. The project worked closely with the Cobbold Family History Trust in purchasing and loaning Cobbold brewery artefacts. An interpretation board was developed for the room along with a display cabinet showing Cobbold brewery memorabilia.


The room also provides an audio visual display which shows footage about the park. These include:

- 2 Footage of the Heritage Lottery-funded restoration of the park
- 3 Paper cuttings of Lady Elizabeth Cobbold
- 4 A 3D virtual reality graphic pictorial and audio model of the building and development of the Cobbold mansion

Interactive interpretation is provided by encouraging the audience to make up their own drink and write it down to hang on the brewers frame. The master brewer each week will then decide what drink he will brew the following week from all the choices and promote the new drink and the name of the drink inventor by writing the details on to the master brewer's barrel in the interpretation room.

Dress up clothes for brewers are also provided.









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

2.2 INTERPRETATION BOARDS & QUICK RESPONSE CODES

The project has designed and installed a series of interpretation boards about the heritage and nature of Holywells Park. The boards form trails around the park, complimented by leaflets and Augmented Reality (AR) that include:

HERITAGE BOARDS

The heritage boards were researched by tourism students from the University of Suffolk. The students were given a brief for each board to research and once completed presented their interpretation boards to the Project Board. The information was then passed to Lifechart, an independent designer of interpretation boards that had previously worked with the Cobbold

Family History Trust. Working with the University presented the opportunity for the students and the project to work together to develop AR for the boards. The AR works by downloading a free app to a smart device called Aurasma. As part of the project Kesgrave High School undertook a feasibility study for using smart devices at the park. The University also carried out its own survey for the strength of phone signals on a variety of devices to ensure using apps in the park would work.

The AR symbol next to an image on the boards indicates that the image has AR behind it and to use a smart device to access it.



The Ice House

The Ice House board presents information about the newly discovered and restored Ice House, how and what an Ice House were used for and why.

The AR is an audio animation film of the workings of an Ice House. The animation film was developed and produced with voice over by students of Suffolk New Collage (SNC).

As the Ice House is locked the user can also view the inside of the Ice House via the augmented reality showing footage of inside the Ice House. This was developed by University of Suffolk students.

The Holywells Ice House The first first all the second of the second of

Thomas Gainsborough

This board is positioned where it is believed Gainsborough stood and painted his famous depiction of Holywells Park (1748 – 1750).

The board gives information about Gainsborough and his links with Holywells Park and the Cobbold Family.

The AR for the board is a drone flight over the park following the ponds that form the backbone of the park that Gainsborough once painted.










The Spring

The Spring board presents information about the park's spring, why the park is called Holywells Park and how the spring water relates to the Cobbold brewery industry. The AR on this board is in the form of old photographs of the Cobbold Brewery at the end of Cliff Lane.



Holywells Park through the ages

This board shows a history of Holywells Park from prehistoric times to when the Cobbold's started to acquire land around Holywells Park.



Holywells Life through the Wars


Through the Wars board presents a variety of information from community events held by the Cobbold to help keep morale up during war time, to a bomb nicknamed Herman falling on to the park to an RAF Vampire crashing on to a house at the entrance to the park.

Home of the Cobbolds

Board 6 of the trail stands in front of what would have been the Cobbold mansion. It shows a brief history of the occupants, pictures within the Mansion and what the building was used for throughout its life.

The AR shows a 3D animated model of the buildings development through the different Cobbolds and photographs of inside and around the mansion.



The Holywells Conservatory

Showcasing the Victorian Conservatory as it once was, this pictorial board presents some amazing photos of the conservatory in its hey day.

The board explains about Lady Elizabeth's plant collecting and shows features of the conservatory.



The Holywells Park and Gardens

The last board in the trail is within the parks walled garden. It shows old landscapes and formal gardens that are within the park, some of which have completely disappeared.

The AR for the board presents more historic photographs of formal gardens and landscapes of the park.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

NATURE TRAIL BOARDS

The nature boards were developed by the IBC Wildlife Team incorporating wildlife and habitats you will find at Holywells Park. The illustrations were produced by a local artist and Design Team. These again use AR technology in the form of a quiz. Each board presents three multiple choice questions about the topic of each board. The questions are aimed at family learning and Key Stage 1-3 for schools that visit the park. The boards that make up the Nature Trail in the park are:

The butterfly board explains that butterflies have delicate and often complex lifecycles and aids the observer in finding out which plant butterflies need to survive.

There are three multiple choice questions from the AR on the board give as text and in audio.

For example question 1:

The butterfly starts out as life as what?

a) Egg b) Caterpillar c) Chrysalis

Bird Song

This board is an audio board using a U Turn device which integrates into a panel to provide audio interpretation outdoors.

Instructions on the front of the sign show how to use the audio equipment, select the audio from the eight available using the rotary message selector, turn the handle until the audio sounds.

The board has eight different bird songs you will hear at the park.



Butterfly Board









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?



Woodland Board

This describes the ecology of the woodland and its composition. The observer will learn about the different layers and interactions between the plants and species that inhabit such a diverse habitat.

The AR on the board presents three multiple questions about woodlands and seasons that relate to Key Stage 1-2.


The AR explains:

In the colder climates deciduous trees shed their leaves in the autumn in preparation for the cold winter. As the temperature begins to increase many spring flowers make the most of the un-shaded forest floor and bloom before the trees come back into leaf.

Question 1:

Which of these is not a deciduous tree?

- a) An Oak
- b) A Scots Pine
- c) A Sweet Chestnut



Dead Wood Board

The board explains about the importance of dead wood habitat to biodiversity and that bits of dead wood on the floor in the park have not been forgotten, they are left to provide essential habitat.

The AR explains about food chains:

Plants are called producers because they make their own food. They are at the start of a food chain. Animals are consumers because they eat other plants and animals. A predator is an animal that eats other animals .The animals that predators eat are called prey. Organisms that break down dead material such as fallen wood are known as decomposers.

Question 1 asks:

Which of these decomposers is not an animal?

- a) Stag beetle
- b) Beefsteak fungus
- c) Woodlice







WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Night-time Board

Once the park visitors are gone, the park isn't as quiet as you might think. The board describes some species using the park at night including bats, owls, moths and foxes.

The AR talks about adaptations of species to enable them to survive.

Every plant or animal lives in a habitat. A habitat is another name for their local environment. Plants and animals often have to change in order to survive and fit their habitat. This is known as adaptation.





Pond Life

The pond life board was an existing board in the park that the project incorporated into the newly developed Wildlife Trail.

Traditional Orchard

The board explains about the importance of traditional orchards and their associated wildlife. It explains about the habitats ecology and wildlife you will find in a traditional orchard through the seasons.

The boards AR introduces the observer to photosynthesis:

Photosynthesis is the process by which plants make food using a combination of sunlight, water and carbon dioxide.

Anything that photosynthesises is known as a producer.

A question from the AR is:



Veteran Trees


An existing board incorporated into the trail, the final board describes the importance of veteran trees in the park. Veteran trees have lots of places for wildlife to explore and use.



Meadows

The meadow board is an existing board that the project incorporated into the Wildlife Trail.

The board describes long grass and meadows habitats and its associated species. Long grass and flowers offer shelter and food for many species. The board shows the diverse mix of creatures that use the meadow.









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

2.3 DESIGN, DEVELOP AND INSTALL A SERIES OF TRAILS

The project has designed, developed and installed a series of trails around Holywells Park. Some of the trails have previously been mentioned in section 1.3, 2.2 and 2.3.

The trails include:

Nature Trail

A circular route around the park that takes in nine interpretation boards about the wildlife you can discover in the park complimented with an AR quiz for family and school learning activities.

Heritage Trail

A circular route that takes in the key heritage features of the park described by eight interpretation boards complimented by AR technology as described in 2.2 and 2.3 above.

Tree Trail

The tree trail is complimented by the tree trail leaflet as described in 1.3.3. The trail leaflet or the AR app Layar, guides the user to 24 species of tree within the park. The app uses GPS technology that locates and guides the user to the tree using a smart device. Once the user arrives at a specific tree on the trail the app will show text and give an audio description of the tree on the smart device. The project used the app for the trail to reduce signage in the heritage landscape of the park.

Historic Photo Trail

As described in 1.3.4 the Historic Photo Trail leaflet guides the user around the park to key points where a smart device is used to view historic photos in the modern landscape. The app use GPS to position the user and the photo image onto the parks vista. The trail shows 28 historic photos of the park including the Cobbold Mansion demolished in 1962.

Art Trail

Holywells Creative, Holywells Park's volunteer art group, has created a number of art installations around the park that form an Art Trail. The various members of the group are continuously adding to the trail. Currently the Art Trail consists of "the Guardians of the Park" 12 wooden sculpture representing the Roman gods for the 12 months of the year, a spry painted mural highlighting the importance of nature, a hedgehog sculpture and three wooden sculptures depicting three stages of life from infancy to old age.

2.4 ELECTRONIC EDUCATIONAL PACKAGE

The project has developed an Environmental Education Pack designed for teachers, community groups and families to have fun learning about Holywells Park and its wildlife, introducing young people to the natural environment.

The pack has been designed around the habitats and species that can be found at Holywells Park. The packs activities relate to the National Curriculum Key Stage 1 & 2 levels with some activities suitable at Key Stage 3 level.

The pack contains:

- An introduction with information about the park, how to get to the park and risk assessments
- Lifecycles
- Adaptations
- Wildlife
- Habitats
- Soil
- Sensory
- Energy
- Seasons

Each part of the pack is a separate pdf file so users can download and print out which section of the pack they require, cutting down on paper use and printing costs.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

2.5 CREATE THREE OUTDOOR CLASSROOM/GATHERING PLACES

The project decided to build three outdoor classrooms to aid learning. The locations for the outdoor classrooms are positioned in areas of the park to represent different habitats for different activities.

Classroom 1

Positioned in the woodland for forest schools this classroom was originally to be a lockable classroom built from natural materials from the park and local area, with a wooden frame, wattle and daub structure with a thatched roof. The design was not well received by the Friends so the project went back to the drawingboard. It was decided to go for an open structure with a roof. The classroom is well used by school groups, SWT and Forest Schools as well as members of the public as a resting and gathering place.



A more informal structure located beneath and framed by trees, this classroom consist of a thirty log seated circle surrounded by circular hurdle fencing for environmental education, storytelling events and a tranquil area to rest. There is a central throne seat for the storyteller or teacher carved by a chainsaw. The timber came from a large oak that blew down in the park from St Jude's Storm. The area is very popular with forest schools, story telling activities and birthday parties. The classroom was created by volunteers.

Classroom 3

This classroom is an informal 30-log seat circle next to wildflower meadow and ponds for school and community group environmental education. The classroom is used by forest schools, schools and Suffolk Wildlife Trust. It is also a popular gathering area for dog walkers.











3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

2.6 DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A 'SENSE OF PLACE' PROJECT.

The project worked with the Volunteer Community Service to deliver the "Sense of Place" project. The project recorded, using film and photography, how the Stable Block, Conservatory and park landscape was before the delivery phase, through the delivery stage and project completion. The short film includes the project manager, Cevo, park manager, architects, contractors and volunteers who all helped restore the park.

The footage forms part of the audio visual interpretation material within the Stable Block and has been used for many presentations to community groups to highlight the work the project has achieved. The footage is also available for customers to purchase as a DVD from the Stable Block shop.

Section 2 of the DVD is recordings of events in the park after the delivery phase. The footage features the Friends of Holywells Park and their events, the Holi event and Family Fun days. Section 2 also captures the memories of young and old individuals and their stories of the park.

2.7 DEVELOP A PROGRAMME OF FOREST SCHOOLS AT HOLYWELLS PARK

A Forest School is an innovative educational approach to outdoor play and learning in a woodland environment aimed at Primary School children. Through the project Holywells Park has become a destination park for Forest School activities.

A number of outside organisations, schools and community groups now run regular forest school sessions at Holywells Park. As part of the project a number of forest school awareness and training sessions for teachers and community groups were held in the Victorian Conservatory and the park as a whole. These were run by SWT and were very well attended. The sessions not only introduced and taught about the concept of forest schools but introduced the park to local school teachers as an educational aid.

Kirsty Bartle, of Muddy Boots forest schools, writes:

"Holywells Park helped to build the local interest in our nature toddler group. Parent feedback was they loved the park as they felt safe and it was well maintained."







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

2.8 DEVELOP A PROGRAMME OF BUSH CRAFT SKILLS

Initially, the project was to work with an individual to host bush craft skill workshop for youngsters from local schools. Unfortunately this was unable to be delivered.

The project decided to work with a local library youth group from the Gainsborough Ward of Ipswich, less than a mile from the park. Gainsborough Ward is among the most deprived in the country. Of the (6) Lower Super Output Areas comprising the ward 50% are within the 10% most relatively deprived (decile 1) in the 2015 Indices of Multiple Deprivation. Deprivation relating to skills is particularly high. 66.7% of LSOAs in the ward were in the 10% most relatively deprived areas nationally (decile 1) within the Education, Skills & Employment domain. All Gainsborough LSOAs were within the 30% most deprived.

The park held conservation and gardening activities for the youth club on a regular basis. The activities were well intended with an age range from 10 – 18.

SWT also runs bush craft sessions in the park as part of their Closer to Nature project. The sessions are well attended by individuals from the local community and wider area.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

2.9 INSTALL A BAT REHABILITATION HOME

The project was approached by a member of the Mid Anglian Bat Group (MAGB) within the development phase with the proposal to supply and install a bat rehabilitation home in the Leaf Yard for bats that have been found injured and need to recover.

The project board fully supported this concept and wanted to work with MABG to achieve the desired outcome. It is with regret that the MABG folded and the project could not fulfil this outcome.

2.10 AN EXHIBITION OF LADY ELIZABETH COBBOLD'S VALENTINE SCHERENSCHNITTE

The project has held three exhibitions of Lady Elizabeth's Valentine Scherenschnitte, paper cutting designs cut from a single sheet of paper as opposed to multiple adjoining sheets as in collage.

The exhibitions were hosted by the Cobbold Family History Trust accompanied by paper cutting demonstration workshops led by Lois Cordelia and her mother Erika Bulow-Osborne. These were held in the conservatory which once adjoined Lady Elizabeth's drawing room where she would have once sat to do her paper cutting.

Working with the Cobbold Family History Trust, it was decided to work with the Ipswich Museums Service to photograph and make digital copies of all of the papercuts held by the Trust. This was to show the papercuts at demonstrations/exhibitions without potentially damaging the originals and preserve them for future generations. The audio visual screen within the Stables now presents more than 50 papercuts.





3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

OUTCOME 3: INCREASING RANGE OF VOLUNTEERS

The project was tasked with obtaining £329,000 of volunteer time. This initially was deemed unachievable by the HLF as no project had ever accumulated that amount of volunteer time. A comprehensive Volunteer Action Plan was developed by the Cevo to present to the HLF outlining how the project would achieve its volunteer target. The Volunteer Action Plan was submitted as part of the projects Activity Plan and was accepted by the HLF.

As of 30th June 2018, the end of the project, Holywells Park had accumulated 6,383 volunteer days amounting to £493,491 of volunteer time, an increased of 33% of the original target. This is one of the project's major successes and helped delivery the entire volunteer action plan and much more. How the project achieved this major success is outlined below.

3.1 DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A PROGRAMME OF WEEKLY CONSERVATION AND HORTICULTURAL TASKS

The project developed a programme of weekly horticultural and conservation tasks. The programme developed into the two volunteer work groups at the park, The Gardening Club (GC) and the Volunteer Rangers (VR) as discussed below in 3.3 and 3.4.

Both volunteer opportunities were advertised and promoted on site in noticeboards, the local media and on IBC's website and social media. Word of mouth was also a means of attracting volunteers. The VR and GC are still running weekly in the park with several original volunteers still attending. The Cevo also attended volunteer fayres at the local university and colleges promoting the opportunities available at Holywells Park as well as working in partnership with Ipswich Job Centre and Volunteer Suffolk.

3.2 DEVELOP THE ROLE OF VOLUNTEER LEADERS

The project trained up a five individuals to lead the two volunteer groups in the park. The training that the volunteers received is discussed in 4.1. The training of the volunteers has allowed the VR and GC become sustainable and self managing groups.




Table 6 Actual and predicted Volunteer Match funding

"When I first started the gardening club, it was clear from the start the group would be a great asset to the Holywells gardens and our team. 3.3 DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT HOLYWELLS PARK GARDENING CLUB

The GC was set up to help deliver, manage and maintain all the new horticultural planting areas within Holywells Park. This includes the Walled Garden, Lower Terrace, the maze and the Dell Garden. The GC was initially trained and supervised by Holywells staff.

The GC runs every Tuesday from 10am to 4pm with an average of eight volunteers per session. The GC has run stalls at park events selling plants, books and arts and crafts. The money they have raised has enabled them to buy their own tools, equipment and refreshments which support the groups long-term sustainability and to continue long after the life of the project.







WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

3.4 **DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT HOLYWELLS** PARK CONSERVATION CLUB

The park's Conservation Club, now known as the Volunteer Rangers, assist with the management and maintenance of the wider park landscape. The VR undertook key projects of the capital works and activity plan. These projects will be outlined below as part of the projects outcomes for increasing volunteers. The conservation tasks were the first volunteering opportunities to be undertaken as part of the project in line with the early stages of the projects delivery phase.

The volunteers were first led by a volunteer leader, employed two days a week by the project for 18 months and in this time compiled all the risk assessments and trained up some volunteers to become volunteer leaders.

Again the VR were supplied with tools and equipment, PPE and logoed tops and hi-vis clothing. The VR group meets every Wednesday from 10am - 4pm to undertake a wide range of practical conservation and estate maintenance tasks inline with the park's Management and Maintenance Plan. The VR are a selfled sustainable group that will continue long after the life of the project.

Lee Gilham, the projects volunteer leader, writes:

"I am proud to have been the Volunteer Co-ordinator throughout the Holywells Park Restoration Project. As an associate employee of the Green Light Trust, my remit was to procure, train and lead groups of volunteers to carry out the variety of projects required of the project. This was carried out for two days per week over a period of some 18 months and covered a very wide range of undertakings from forestry, grassland conservation, building outdoor classrooms and exercise equipment, renovation of a historic structure (an 'Ice House'), planting gardens, creating paths and stairways, fencing and many more. I don't believe I have ever had a more enjoyable and gratifying job!

The volunteers were drawn from many walks of life: in addition to a regular group of local people taking pride in restoring their local park, many of the participating volunteers were from disadvantaged backgrounds – for example groups of 'special needs' youngsters, recovering addicts, excluded school pupils and the long-term unemployed. It was heartening to witness the enjoyment and huge increase in self-esteem that learning new skills and working in such a lovely environment brought to many of these people – indeed, in several cases this led to further education and to full-time employment.

I thoroughly enjoyed my time working on the Holywells Park Restoration Project and am immensely proud of what myself and the volunteers achieved. It was therefore an unexpected but perfect added bonus that I was able to successfully apply for a full-time job with Ipswich Borough Council based within the park once the restoration project had finished – I am therefore able to appreciate the fruits of the project every working day!"









3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

3.5 IMPROVE VISITOR WELCOME & RECEPTION EXPERIENCE

Within the development phase of the project it was thought that volunteers would operate and administer the Stable Block reception and shop outlet.

IBC then took the decision that it would employ a member of staff to manage and operate the reception and shop outlet. Visitor satisfaction is monitored by a visitors comment book and feedback form both of which are found in the reception.

3.6 DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A STRATEGY FOR FOHP AND VOLUNTEERS TO LEAD A PROGRAMME OF HERITAGE AND ENVIRONMENT GUIDED WALKS

A strategy was developed to aid Friends and volunteers to lead walks at Holywells Park. The strategy involved communication with community groups, training in leading guided walks and helping with the promotion of walks. Groups and organisation which worked with the project to lead guided walks at the park were:

3.7 DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT THE ROLE OF VOLUNTEERS TO SUPPORT EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES AT HOLYWELLS PARK

The IBC events team have a pool of volunteers that assisted in the set up, running and dismantling of events at Holywells Park. This enabled Holywells Park volunteers who were interested in also volunteering at events to become involved.

From the experience and skills they obtained through assissting with the events team they now volunteer with outside organisations which host park events which is beneficial for both parties.

3.8 VOLUNTEER HEALTH WALK LEADERS

The park developed and implemented a strategy for FoHP and volunteers to be trained and to lead a programme of health walks. Working in partnership with Stepping Out in Suffolk, four volunteers were trained as Health Walk Leaders. The volunteers worked with Stepping Out in Suffolk to hold health walks in the park as walk leaders or back markers.

The project was very successful and continues today with volunteers from ActivLives leading park walks and making use of the Stable Café for drinks and socialise which is an aim of health walks. |The walks occur once a month with an average of 12 attendees.

3.9 VISITOR OBSERVATION SURVEYS

As part of the project's evaluation as discussed in "The People" section above, the project carried out 22 visitor observations surveys per year. The surveys were carried out by FoHP volunteers recording visitor data.

Fifteen volunteers were trained to conduct the surveys. This worked well although in one year the project did not complete all the surveys due to volunteers not being available. Conducting the survey is a big commitment for volunteers and it may be beneficial to put some financial costing towards paying an independent service to complete surveys.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

3.10 WILDLIFE SURVEYS

Within the duration of the project volunteers have been trained in surveying techniques for many types of biodiversity. This has increased wildlife surveys in the park enormously, helping to guide future habitat management of the park. Surveys have included:

- Golden Hoverfly
- Breeding and resident birds
- Nest box
- Flowering Plants
- Fungi
- Reptiles and Amphibians
- Bird Ringing
- Small mammals
- Butterfly and moths
- Bats
- Pond Surveys

Appendix 7 contains the park's Bioblitz Species Report conducted and recorded by volunteers and SWT.

3.11& 3.12 WORK WITH LOCAL COMPANIES FOR CORPORATE VOLUNTEER DAYS

The project worked with many local companies which undertook volunteer team building days at the park. Companies which came to the park for a volunteer day were:

Tasks focused on practical conservation management including woodland coppicing and tree planting, cutting and raking meadows and footpath improvements. The corporate volunteer days averaged 25 volunteers per day and each company attend at least once a year throughout the life of the project.

3.13 WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH EDUCATIONAL LEARNERS TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A PROGRAMME OF ENVIRONMENTAL, HERITAGE, MULTIMEDIA AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT TASKS

The project worked with numerous educational learners to achieve many different projects within the parks activity plan that have been discussed in sections 1 and 2.

The educational learners the project have worked with include:

- Cliff Lane Primary School

The educational learners that the project has worked with range from Key Stage 1 & 2, Degree level education and vulnerable children and adults. The students have been from mainstream education, students with complex social, emotional and communication difficulties and students with behavioural, social and mental health difficulties that have been excluded from mainstream school.







WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?

Below are some reviews form educational learners:

Martin Weston, Vocational and Transitional Manager from the Raewald Trust, writes:

"I would like to state that Holywells Park and The Raedwald Trust have worked in partnership for the last four years and have given many young people opportunities to experience real working opportunities as part of the Volunteer Park Ranger team. These experiences have allowed young people with very complex issues such as behavioural, social and mental health difficulties experience a real working environment and gain many practical and employability skills. It has also helped students to look at their post - 16 options and we have seen two of the students who accessed this project advance onto Easton & Otley College to study horticulture and another to study Arboriculture as a direct result of working in partnership.

Since we have worked together we have been nominated and were runner up in the EADT BUSINESS AWARDS 2017 - THE YOUTH PLEDGE, who recognised the work we are doing together to support young people in the local community and to help them to develop skills for the future."

Damian McCarthy, an Enablement Practitioner of Leading Lives, writes:

As a progression worker, one of my roles involves finding opportunities for people with additional needs, learning disabilities, mental health, autism and Asperger's.

One thing requested is opportunity to work outdoors. Holywells offers many opportunities with two volunteer groups to realise this for my clients.

I have supported three men who wished to volunteer with Holywells, both with the Park Rangers and Gardening Group. One man in particular enjoyed the group so much he volunteers for the Park Rangers every week come rain or shine. He has learned many skills from coppicing of trees to laying new paths and has been attending for over two years now. Although my work with him only lasted six weeks, it is nice to see him still enjoying the role I supported him in to with Holywells help.

Holywells has been a great resource to refer people to volunteer with and the staff

3.14 CREATE AND MANAGE AN ARCHIVE OF THE PARK'S HERITAGE

The project was to catalogue artefacts from the park in order to make the archival collection more widely accessible to the general public. A FoHP member wanted to take on this project but unfortunately was not able to complete the work.

The project decided to work with Ipswich Museums Service and the Cobbold Family History Trust to try to collect and present and archival collection of Holywells Park. This was achieved with a collection of historic photos, archiving and displaying Lady Elizabeth's Valentine paper cuts, procurring and displaying Cobbold Brewery memorabilia and fitting out the Tack Room within the Stable Block with Museum pieces that once belonged to the Cobbold Family.

Points 3.15 to 3.26 in the Activity Plan that is listed below have all been completed by volunteers.

- Installation of the Trim Trail
- Installation of the orienteering course
- Installation of the Measured Mile
- Repair of footpaths
- Install new bridges and resurface footpath along canal path
- Excavation of the Ice House
- Install new footpath to I-Play
- Creation of outdoor classrooms
- Installation of interpretation boards
- Installation of informal benches
- Implement the planting of the Maze, Dell and herbaceous borders
- Management and maintenance of the Maze, Dell and herbaceous borders



The report at this point will focus on the excavation of the Ice House as a volunteer task.

Pre-project the Ice House was an undiscovered entity of Holywells Park. Stories were abounding of the Holywells Park Ice House but its location had never been discovered. The project made a public appeal to the public to see if someone could remember the location of the infamous Ice House. The appeal was successful and an individual guided us to its general location. After an investigation of the area the project found a curved brick structure at ground level and called in Suffolk County Council Archaeological Department.

The Archaeological Department confirmed we had discovered the Ice House. Volunteers uncovered the brickwork, vegetation that over the years had grown around it was removed and Volunteer Rangers uncovered what was left of its structure.

The project's structural engineers surveyed the remaining structure and confirmed it was sound and good to be restored.

The project contacted Suffolk New College's Building and Construction Department with the proposal for the college's students to take on the project to restore the brickwork of the Ice House. The College greatly appreciated the opportunity for students to build such a unique heritage structure and the knowledge and skill they would gain from being part of the project.

Carpentry students were involved constructing wooden dome formers for the domed roof and arched entrance tunnel, and bricklaying students completed the brick work. The students constructed the building with heritage materials, including Suffolk Red bricks and lime mortar.







3. WHAT HAS THE PROJECT ACHIEVED?



After the construction was completed the decision was made with the Heritage Lottery Fund and the IBC Heritage Conservation Officer not to cover the structure with earth to increase it's insulation, but to leave it uncovered so visitors could see the structure. The Volunteer Rangers landscaped the area and installed steps with recycled materials and a post and rail fence.



Roger Prophet, Lecturer at Suffolk New College, writes:

"When we (Suffolk New College) were invited to restore an Victorian Ice House that was discovered at Holywells Park in Ipswich, my colleague and I went to the site to have a look at the task at hand. We discussed how we would attempt to restore the Ice House with the help of Level 2 & 3 brick and carpentry students.

With the help of the internet we got the students involved with looking at what Ice Houses were, how they were constructed and what they were used for. The entrance way construction, a typical semi-circle rough ringed arch, we were familiar with and the L3 students had already completed some theory work in the classroom relating to this subject. We selected students, took the necessary arch forms and estimated the materials we would need for Carters to supply the materials: Red bricks, sand and lime (no cement) which again, the students were familiar using. This was a good practical lesson on estimating materials for the students, as well as working on dimensions, radius and circumference.

The dome of the Ice House was a bigger challenge. After liaising with the carpentry tutors, we came up with a plan to construct an arch centre, which we believed could support the span and the weight of two courses of bricks across the dome. We also decided we would put galvanised metal sheet lathe inbetween the courses of bricks. On this occasion we took the whole group of L2 students to the project and over four sessions we were able to construct the dome successfully. The students really enjoyed and engaged with the work.

We had to form a human chain to get bricks from the two packs at the foot of hill to where the Ice House was, so we could lay them. This was a useful practical experience for the students as they may engage in something similar on a construction site or project. The students were assigned various responsibilities, mixing mortar, general labouring (fetching and carrying bricks) and they took turns laying bricks, valuable experience for the construction industry. The students enjoyed working together as a team, away from the campus with knowledge that the tutors trusted them to behave in a public space (being professional and well mannered) and the tutors believed they had the competence to re-build the Ice House successfully. The generations to see. After the successful re-build we all gathered around the Ice House dome for a group photograph.

I know several of the students who took part have taken their parents and friends up to Holywells Park to view the Ice House since. All in all it has been a great experience for both students and tutors to take part in."

4 IMPROVING SKILLS THROUGH KNOWLEDGE AND TRAINING

Formal training that the project provided is presented in the table below. In total the project has covered 22 training areas with 218 volunteers and 24 staff undertaking formal training.

4. PROJECT REVIEW

4.1 WHAT WORKED WELL AND WHY?

The governance of the project was excellent. The project, client and design boards were highly effective and actively involved all decisions. The boards were proactive and responsive and actively worked with partners and stakeholders to achieve solutions to challenges as they arose. The overall governance was helped with regular progress meetings and reports attaining effective communication. Throughout the project, principal contractor and client communication worked really well.

The Parks for People project has been an invaluable learning experience for staff and IBC in general and will help guide future IBC projects. With such a hugely rewarding project successfully delivered, IBC is confident about taking on new challenges at other parks and thinking bigger with regards to the scope of what can be achieved.

Some of the greatest and most valuable lessons learnt encompassed community engagement. Holywells Park a once under-used undiscovered gem, has now become a jewel of Ipswich. One of the great successes in community engagement has been the extensive event and activity programme working with hard to reach community groups.

By developing, organising and hosting such a diverse and regular schedule of events the diversity of the parks audience in age, ability and ethnicity has increased dramatically. Community engagement and publicity has also helped the project gain its massive $\mathfrak{L}493,491$ worth of volunteer time exceeding the projects target by $\mathfrak{L}164,491$.

4.2 WHAT COULD HAVE BEEN IMPROVED?

During the delivery of the capital works specific issues where identified that had not come to light during the development phase including damp issues in the café space, asbestos and structural issues in the clock tower (hidden items), ground conditions for foundations to the kiosk and its electrical amperage supply. These issues were all rectified as part of the project, though exhausting the contingency budget. For future projects it would be beneficial to conduct robust buildings, ground and mechanical and electrical surveys (where practical) from the principal designer to achieve a realistic funding budget for the project.

Through the delivery phase it came apparent that errors existed in the specification excluding minor items, this may be due to the prompt turnaround of the Round 2 submission. Future projects should ensure better communication between the client and architect to deliver the project's goals. In hindsight a Clerk of Works would have been beneficial to deliver the capital works to ensure a high-quality build and reduce snagging items.

At times it was problematic for volunteers to complete the Visitor Observation Survey in the allotted time slots and in 2014/15 the data sets were incomplete. This was due to a low response and enthusiasm from volunteers conducting the surveys and planned volunteer holidays at the same time as the surveys – school summer holidays. A consideration for the future would be to contract the annual surveys out. Not only would they be completed but also add consistency to ensure a more robust data set.

Due to a number of staff changes at IBC within the life of the HLF project, issues arouse delivering the project's Activity Plans Action Plan. An assurance should be agreed when formulating the Action Plan with internal departments. For future projects, responsibilities and commitments need to be approved and agreed in the form of a contract with internal project partners to ensure consistency in delivering the project's programme.

5. PROJECT LEGACY

The success of the Holywells Park Parks for People project has been making people aware of Holywells Park as a visitor destination, creating a multicultural and multi-age audience for the park with bespoke events, activities and education occurring for the whole community.

Holywells Park visitors now have an increased knowledge about the heritage and environment of the park and are be able to access all the historic buildings and landscapes. There is be a wider range of cultural, heritage and environmental events and a health and wellbeing package for visitors to enjoy, attracting a wider audience into the park. The project reached its target audiences increasing over 45s, BAME groups, single adults, access groups and teenagers.

The park has been transformed into a safe enjoyable area for local residents and visitors to enjoy. The project has also prompted the Friends of Holywells Park to fund continuing projects helping to develop the park after the life of the project.

The restoration of the Stable Block has provided a sustainable community hub, a café, an information point and heritage educational resources. The changing places have allowed and encouraged an audience into the park that was unable to attend previously. The restoration of the conservatory has created a multifunctional space which can be hired out for events and private parties which has increased the income generation for the park.

The landscape restoration has enabled areas of the park that were run down and not accessible to be inclusive again. New play area facilities, toilets, changing room and kiosk, footpaths, foot bridges, benches and signage have opened up areas of the park that were once not used to able and disabled visitors.

The park now offers education and interpretation opportunities regarding its wildlife and heritage in the form of interpretation boards, trails and leaflets. All information relating to the park can be located on the Holywells Park Ipswich Borough Council webpage and the new Friends of Holywells Park website, Facebook and Twitter accounts.

Many of the events created and funded through the project will continue after the projects life including the Family Fun Days and the Holi Festival. Independent event organisers that the project attracted will continue to use the park for events, including the Nearly Festival, Outdoor Cinema, Pam's House, Noise of Art and outdoor theatre.

The health and wellbeing package that the park now offers is a complete fitness programme including a trim trail, outdoor hydraulic gym equipment, I-play, five-a-side goals, health walks, Nordic walking, orienteering, fitness classes including Tai Chi and yoga, guided walks and tea dances.

The project has contributed to help build and sustain a robust Friends group. The Friends now run events throughout the year and participate in other park events, solely manage the park's orchard and make the park's own honey which is sold in the Stable Block shop.

The development and implementation of the Sense of Place project recording using film and photography to DVD of the stable block, conservatory and park landscape being restored through the delivery stage, project completion and opening ceremony is a great legacy for the project. The DVD also contains footage of park events and memories of the park from park visitors and local residents. The DVD is on sale in the Stable Block shop.

Along with the Friends the creation of the Gardening Club and Volunteer Rangers help with the park's maintenance and have assisted in the project reaching £493,491 of volunteer time, an increase of 33% of the original target.

The project has been successful, gaining a Green Flag Award for the last eight years with an ever increasing score (Appendix 8). The project has been awarded a distinction for the Holywells Park renovation by the Ipswich Society in 2015 (Appendix 9) and was the winner of the Civic Voice Design Awards 2016 – a project in the public realm category (Appendix 10) which was received at the Houses of Parliament. The park has attained 4.5 star status on TripAdvisor for the constant achievement of high ratings from visitors (Appendix 11).

As part of the Heritage Lottery Project, a commitment has been made by Ipswich Borough Council to a 10 year Management and Maintenance Plan ensuring that Holywells Park will be well managed into the future.




Do you consider yourself to have a disability or long term illness that affects your use of open spaces?

Partnership work with Holywells Park, Ipswich

Bangladeshi Support Centre

Bangladeshi Support Centre (BSC) is an award-winning charity and community organization. It was established in 1998 by a group of dedicated community volunteers aiming to improve the lives and well-being of the growing Bangladeshi and other BME population in Ipswich and Suffolk. BSC subsequently became a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee, and for more than 2 decades it has been playing a significant role in improving the quality of life of local Bangladeshi and other BME people in Suffolk.

The multicultural community make-up of Suffolk is reflected in its client group. BSC supports people of all different backgrounds, culture, faith, age, and gender accessing services such as, trainings and other activities including Moroccan, Portuguese, Uzbekistani, Pakistani, Indian, White Semitic, Afro-Caribbean, White American, White British, Italian, German, Sri Lankan, Ethiopian, Chinese, Kurdish, and mixed ethnicity. People of 40 different nationalities are currently accessing BSC services, trainings and other activities. BSC also encourages BME people to access mainstream services in order to break down barriers and enable them to integrate into the wider community. BSC is known for its innovative, grass-roots based and community-led approach to community development and regeneration in order to address inequalities by providing different training and projects.

Opportunities through partnership work

Bangladeshi Support Centre has worked in partnership with Holywells Park since its refurbishment on various occasions.

This partnership working provided opportunities for clients from our Carers Project, Bangladeshi Elders Project, Supplementary School children and their families and many others to enjoy not only the beauty of the park but to take part in activities including pond dipping, outdoor bowling, bird nest making, Tai Chi, football tournament, and walks. BSC clients have also had the opportunity to find out more about the history of the park through talks and BSC has been able to promote its work by taking a stall at the annual Holi Festival.

Approximately 700 people took part in the various activities provided by the partnership working, many of whom did not know of the parks existence but are now regular visitors.

Barriers

Unfortunately due to the unpredictability of the British weather there were a few occasions when a planned activity had to be postponed due to being too cold which has meant low numbers turning up or because it has been too windy and therefore the activity had to be cancelled however the park and BSC staff and those leading the activities took these occasions in their stride.

HOLYWELLS CREATIVES EVALUATION REPORT 2018

ART TRAIL

This project was started by Carlos Fernandes during his university course at Suffolk University when he sculpted and installed the 12 months of the year along a pathway. As a result of this, a number of art graduates came together to develop work around the park and in so doing formed Holywells Creatives. To date, various sculptures have been added to the park: Michelle Bowden's Graffitti Wall and Carlos 's three sculptures near the children's play area entitled "Spiral Trilogy". Peta Hillier's hedgehog sits in the stables and is a reflection of the park's pro active message about wildlife. It was named in a public competition as Stickle and was reported in the press along with links to Ipswich's hedgehog officer.

The art trail is still a project in the making and proposals put forward by the group are potentially there to expand the art trail. The provision of materials for these projects and suitability are part of the discussion for further development.

The group has been delighted by the opportunity given by the park and by the close co-operation of Richard Sharp and Nick Wilcox to develop this art trail and hope to continue this feature.

FFD EVENTS FAMILY WILDLIFE DAY

For the past three years the group have had a place in the Wildlife day. This has involved us in various art activities which engaged with adults and children. One year, with the provision of grass paint, Peta Hillier designed and installed a large maze which was walked around by over 100 people including the mayor of Ipswich. Michelle began her memory tree installation which captures and records memories of parks and displays in different forms, both sculptural and mixed media. All these activities were offered free of charge and are useful to develop art activities in the park.

SKETCH AND STROLL and LOCAL COMMUNITY

This continues to be one of our most successful events in the park! For the past three years the Creatives run a Sunday sketch and stroll session for two hours once a month. The experience of walking amongst the trees and parkland is designed to develop drawing skills and to be therapeutic. The public are given a notebook and pencil free of charge, which are provided by art branches, an organisation set up to help mental health through drawing activities. The Park has also provided us with paper and clip boards, but most crucially, the leaflets which are stocked in the stables and help to advertise our walks. The park also use their website to advertise these walks. The feedback we get from each walk is very good and we also have returning artists. Future plans may involve printing a booklet with examples of art from the sketch and stroll group around Holywells Park.Art Branches in Bury St Edmunds has already done this, alongside an exhibition of work, and this would be an excellent development for the park.

EXHIBTIONS AND SALES IN THE CONSERVATORY

We have had the marvellous opportunity to have art exhibitions in the conservatory, once or twice a year. These have engaged local people and have also enabled us to participate in the Christmas faire. Recently, we have used the conservatory to paint and draw and this was a good opportunity for the group to create together. On June 30th we will use the conservatory to develop art work about the park, which we intend to exhibit in the town hall in Ipswich as part of our "Secret Ipswich" exhibition. This will run from August 23 to September 18th. As a result of our work together the group were given the opportunity to exhibit in Prettys solicitors from April until September of 2018. This exhibition has been very successful and has recognised Holywells Creatives as a dynamic and community orientated group.

WHAT THE PROJECT HAS ACHIEVED FOR THE GROUP

Without the park this group would not have existed and without its support it would not be the same. Members live both in Ipswich and surrounding countryside and the park is an inspiring place to be. Our identity is bound up with issues of environment and our mission is to engage with the wider community. We passionately believe that each person is capable of creativity and that art enables us to slow down, connect and re calibrate. We think that these values are part of the park's philosophy. Creating sculptures and having exhibitions have also been made possible by the very constructive actions by the park team: Richard and Nick. Another benefit for the group is publicity: both in the press and on the web; furthermore, our t shirts, kindly provided by the park, advertise us and the Park and we wear them on our sketchbook strolls. We have sold art work but our activities are free. We are dependant, however, on provision of sketch books and pencils and posters from the park and art branches.

WHAT THE PROJECT HAS ACHIEVED FOR ME AS AN INDIVIDUAL

This project has been very important to me in many ways: drawing within the park over the seasons is always inspiring; meeting with other artists and the public engaged in the same process is brilliant. Friendships have developed and new ones made, and always as an art group we are working towards new art, new exhibitions and new projects. Personally, I have enjoyed making Stickle and look forward to creating an art trail. Also, the Stables and everyone there are always friendly and helpful. The whole experience has been extremely beneficial.

FUTURE PLANS

In return we benefit from being in the park and we hope to continue the projects in the Park: Sketchbook strolls, use of Orangery and Family day.

We also hope to develop further art projects in the community, such as having a Grand drawing day in which the public draw trees and views all over the park in one day, leading to a pop up exhibition and or a booklet. We also hope to develop the sculpture trail. At Christmas we also take part in the Christmas faire with the friends of Holywells park. We will continue to have exhibitions in Ipswich under the title of Holywells Creatives. There is also scope for offering watercolour classes in the orangery.


