They address matters that are considered necessary to allow effective and equitable management of the pleasure grounds and open spaces that are not covered under other legislation because without the proposed Byelaws the current Byelaws would remain in place. Further, taking no action would leave many areas and activities unregulated.</p> <p>The proposed Byelaws will replace existing outdated Byelaws and as such it is considered to have a neutral impact in terms of regulatory burden. However the consistency offered in only having one set of rules to cover the Borough, rather than separate ones for different locations may lessen the burden on those affected.</p> <p>The proposed Byelaws are considered preferable to taking no action as the proposed Byelaws will result in a usable set of rules which can be relied upon as a basis for the consistent, effective and equitable management of the pleasure grounds and open spaces whereas no action would leave the Council with the existing Byelaws</p>	Executive Report and Statement of Assessment
