

Returning Officer - Privacy Notice

Introduction

The Returning Officer has provided this privacy notice to help you understand how we collect, use and protect your Personal Data which we hold in order to comply with our duties under The Representation of the People Act 1983.

When reading this document please note that we use the terms 'Personal Data' and 'Personal Information' interchangeably.

The document below will describe how we may collect and process your personal information.

The purpose of this document is to clearly acknowledge the Returning Officer's responsibilities in relation to the United Kingdom General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and the Data Protection Act 2018 (DPA 2018).

The Data Controller for this information is the Returning Officer. Russell Williams is formally appointed as the Returning Officer for Ipswich Borough Council.

Definitions used in this Notice

Personal Data means any information related to an identified or identifiable living individual- known as a 'data subject'.

An individual is regarded as identifiable if they can be identified, directly or indirectly, in particular by reference to an identifier such as a name, an identification number, location data or an online identifier such as an IP address or cookie identifier. Alternatively they can also be identified by one or more factors specific to the physical, physiological, genetic, mental, economic, cultural or social identity of the individual.

Special Personal Data previously known as 'sensitive personal data', relates to race, ethnic origin, politics, religion, trade union membership, genetic data, biometric data (where used to identify a person), health, sex life or sexual orientation. Records of personal data relating to criminal convictions and offences and allegations must be treated in a similar way.

Processing means any operation which is performed on information such as. collection, recording, organisation, structuring, storage, adaption or alteration, retrieval, consultation, use, disclosure by transmission, dissemination or making available, alignment or combination, restriction, erasure or destruction.

	Data Processor is a third party who processes personal data on behalf of the Controller
	Third Party is someone / somebody who is not the Data Controller, the Data Processor or the Data Subject.
Who we are and what do we do:	The Returning Officer and Electoral Services Team are responsible for the administration of elections and referendum in the borough of lpswich.
How we lawfully process Personal Data	Your personal data is being processed under Article 6 (c) [legal obligation] or (e) [public task].
	 The Council processes special category personal data that relates to your political opinion under: Article 9 (e): made manifestly public by the data subject (in this case the candidates for election and their proposers) Article 9 (g) (6): reasons of substantial public interest: statutory or other government purpose
	The Returning Officer regards the lawful and correct treatment of personal information as critical to their successful operations, maintaining confidence between themselves and those with whom they carry out business. The Returning Officer will ensure that they treat personal information correctly in accordance with the law. The legislation that allows us to process your data includes but is not limited to:

When do we collect information about you?	 The information is provided by you when you apply to register to vote. The information is provided by you when you submit a nomination to become a candidate or by others on your behalf.
